Matthew 25:31-46

"When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on the throne of his glory. All the nations will be gathered before him, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats, and he will put the sheep at his right hand and the goats at the left. Then the king will say to those at his right hand, 'Come, you that are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world; for I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me.' Then the righteous will answer him, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry and gave you food, or thirsty and gave you something to drink? And when was it that we saw you a stranger and welcomed you, or naked and gave you clothing? And when was it that we saw you sick or in prison and visited you?' And the king will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of my family, you did it to me.' Then he will say to those at his left hand, 'You that are accursed, depart from me into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels; for I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not give me clothing, sick and in prison and you did not visit me.' Then they also will answer, 'Lord, when was it that we saw you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not take care of you?' Then he will answer them, 'Truly I tell you, just as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me.' And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."

Dear Parishioners and Friends:

If I have had to be as blunt as possible about the meaning of this Gospel reading; it might be that a person might think they are good enough to enter into the Kingdom of God, but it could be just delusional thinking. It is not just the emotional feeling joined with a recitation of a "salvation formula". It might start that way, but that is not all that is expected. The deciding factor might be whether we included in our profession of faith that Jesus is Savior and Lord, our willingness to clothe the naked, greet the stranger, provide water for the thirsty, and visit the imprisoned.

Jesus makes it clear that if we are making our decisions in whether to follow and worship Him based on "what we can get out of it" with no regard "for his family" we are probably heading to the left of the Shepherd.

There is no other faith filled organization in the world that provides more education to the poor, more health care to the sick, and charity to those in need than the Catholic Church. That being said, we are not saved because we are members of the Catholic Church, but by faith do the works Jesus taught his Apostles. The Catholic Faith is that faith which has transcended from the time of Christ to today.

The failure of those who identified themselves as belonging to the "Holy Catholic and Apostolic" church does not nullify the message or the church, any more than the actions of Judas nullify the authenticity of the other eleven Apostles. Each one of us is personally held accountable to keep our lamps trimmed in burning, our light on the lampstand, meeting for prayers and the breaking of the bread. The teachings of Jesus are to be spread to the four corners of the earth. Each one of us, according to our gifts, or to help those in need. The combined faithfulness of believers makes this all possible.

There is one Body, many parts, and we are made stronger by each part contributing to the Body of Christ. When we withdraw our part, we weaken the Body. Everything we do or don't do makes a difference. We are asked to live by our faith, not our weak emotions. We are asked to live by faith, not excuses or looking for loopholes to choose to do nothing. **Aboona.**
