Matthew 10:16-25

"See, I am sending you out like sheep into the midst of wolves; so be wise as serpents and innocent as doves. Beware of them, for they will hand you over to councils and flog you in their synagogues; and you will be dragged before governors and kings because of me, as a testimony to them and the Gentiles. When they hand you over, do not worry about how you are to speak or what you are to say; for what you are to say will be given to you at that time; for it is not you who speak, but the Spirit of your Father speaking through you. Brother will betray brother to death, and a father his child, and children will rise against parents and have them put to death; and you will be hated by all because of my name. But the one who endures to the end will be saved. When they persecute you in one town, flee to the next; for truly I tell you, you will not have gone through all the towns of Israel before the Son of Man comes. A disciple is not above the teacher, nor a slave above the master; it is enough for the disciple to be like the teacher, and the slave like the master. If they have called the master of the house Beelzebul, how much more will they malign those of his household!"

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

When we read, "look what those Jews do to followers of Jesus, 'flog you in their synagogues"; there is a danger of using it to

hate and judge millions on the actions of a few for a very short period of time in history. The tragedy of history is that many people who professed to be followers of Jesus have, thorugh out the centuries, done horrendous acts of violence toward them and others.

We certainly do not want to be judged on the actions of others centeries ago, or in different countries. As we judge so shall we be judged. Which means if we hold all in contempt for what a few did or are doing, we place ourselves to be judged for whatever anyone throughout history who shares our same ethnic mixture and religion. God help us all if that is the case.

This shows us the accuracy in which St. Paul writes, "all have fallen short of the glory of God." Again we are not saved by finding others who have behaved worse than ourselves, but we are saved by the mercy of a compassionate God.

Every country, every community, organization, relationships and even some families have an example of someone among them doing

horrendous harm to others. Gratefully, God's love is more powerful than sin.

Today Christians in most countries are not in danger of being killed by violent persecution. However, the spreading of the Gospel and authentically living it, is in many places being destroyed and wounded by being replaced by activities that have gravely diminished the mission and the command Jesus gave His Apostles. We are gravely neglecting to teach and live the message of Jesus. We have too many churches being closed. When Jesus commanded the Apostles to go out and teach all that He taught them, He wasn't referring to a few verses of "niceness".

When Jesus says those who endure to the end will be saved, one can ponder the ramifications of what happens to the one who does not endure? In several countries the persecution is obvious. The Coptic Christians of Egypt in some places are forced to take their crosses off their churches, there can be no sign of any kind that others would be able to identify it as a Christian Church. They are not even allowed to sing or use instruments loud enough so that someone outside can hear them.

Persecution can be very subtle also. We become uncomfortable with showing or revealing expressions of our faith and beliefs. In America we might not have outward persecution, but it is obvious. Articles about someone within the church will get national news if they did wrong but if someone of a different organization does the same thing, they might get a paragraph located in an obscure place.

In subtle ways, Jesus' statement that within family there is a persecution is bearing out. Those who are older remember never making the decision whether to go to church. It was accepted and practiced; we went to church because our parents were convinced of its value. Now very often it is the child who dictates the actions of the parents. The culture of today, in many places, creates a certainty of the church not surviving. Fasting and prayer is needed for the Church to survive in those place it is struggling to survive, even here in Maine. **Aboona**
