John 4:5-7, 9-26

Jesus came to a Samaritan city called Sychar, near the plot of ground that Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there, and Jesus, tired out by his journey, was sitting by the well. It was about noon. A Samaritan woman came to draw water, and Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink." The Samaritan woman said to him, "How is it that you, a Jew,

ask a drink of me, a woman of Samaria?" (Jews do not share things in common with Samaritans.) Jesus answered her, "If you knew the gift of God, and who it is that is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him, and he would have given you living water." The woman said to him, "Sir, you have no bucket, and the well is deep. Where do you get that living water? Are you greater than our ancestor Jacob, who gave us the well, and with his sons and his flocks drank from it?" Jesus said to her. "Everyone who drinks of this water will be thirsty again, but those who drink of the water that I will give them will never be thirsty. The water that I will give will become in them a spring of water gushing up to eternal life." The woman said to him, "Sir, give me

this water, so that I may never be thirsty or have to keep coming here to draw water."

Jesus said to her, "Go, call your husband, and come back."The woman answered him, "I have no husband." Jesus said to her, "You are right in saying, 'I have no husband'; for you have had five husbands, and the one you have now is not your husband. What you have said is true!" The woman said to him, "Sir, I see that you are a prophet. Our ancestors worshiped on this mountain, but you say that the place where people must worship is in Jerusalem." Jesus said to her, "Woman, believe me, the hour is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. You worship what you do not know; we worship what we know, for salvation is from the Jews. But the hour is coming, and is now here, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for the Father seeks such as these to worship him. God is spirit, and those who worship him must worship in spirit and truth." The woman said to him, "I know that Messiah is coming" (who is called Christ). "When he comes, he will proclaim all things to us." Jesus said to her, "I am he, the one who is speaking to you."

Dear Parishioners and Friends:

A person who knows the culture of the Middle East would know that this has all the potential of a scandal; a man talking to a woman who is alone and of a different religion. Even now, you can read in the papers of the Middle East of explosive violence just based on accusations. Churches have been burned down under similar perceptions.

Jesus made it perfectly clear that he was not intimidated or controlled by our cultures, but daringly through listening, truth, and compassion, He brings hostility to an end and transforms the heart to desire the broken hearted and lost. In a peaceful and loving manner, Jesus became not only a prophet for this woman, but the promised Messiah, her Savior,

Jesus didn't recognize the fifth marriage of this woman, but he didn't stay focused on this fact, but moved to heal the reason she hadn't found lasting faithfulness. We cannot be sure of the reason but we can ponder possible reasons. It appears that instead of knowing the true substance of what makes up a stable loving and caring relationship, she falls for the illusions of what she thinks is love.

We are all aware of the trait of falling for the wrong person over and over, or going from one abusive relationship to the next. Regardless of the circumstances and details of why a marriage might not work out; the focus cannot remain on the anger and bitterness, the blindness of infatuation mistaken for love, or thoughts of guilt and shame.

Jesus offers healing vision to help us see what offers a stable foundation to build a true loving relationship on. We can learn to hear the truth rather than the emotion, feed the life giving spirit rather than the shallow enticements.

Jesus wants to be worshiped in spirit and truth. Truth cannot have contradictions. When I use the Anaphora of St. John Chrysostom, I am reminded of how important this is in the prayer of peace. The living water that Jesus gives is what she wants now, because her way of satisfying her wants did not work.

Cel: Lord God and Father, holy and glorious is your name. You deliver those who love you from all that is contrary to your will. May we, who have remained in your divine love, be made worthy to give one another the greeting of peace with a holy kiss. May we always speak words of peace, think of peace, and work for peace. Through the grace of your only Son and his love for all people, we raise glory to you, and to your living Holy Spirit, now and forever.

The greatest tragedy is when a person of any religion is not speaking and working toward peace. Aboona
