Matthew 25:1-13

The kingdom of heaven will be like this. Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. When the foolish took their lamps, they took no oil with them; but the wise took flasks of oil with their lamps. As the bridegroom was delayed, all of them became drowsy and slept. But at midnight there was a shout, 'Look! Here is the bridegroom! Come out to meet him.' Then all those bridesmaids got up and trimmed their lamps. The foolish said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out.' But the wise replied, 'No! there will not be enough for you and for us; you had better go to the dealers and buy some for yourselves.' And while they went to buy it, the bridegroom came, and those who were ready went with him into the wedding banquet; and the door was shut. Later the other bridesmaids came also, saying, 'Lord, lord, open to us.' But he replied, 'Truly I tell you, I do not know you.' Keep awake therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour."

Dear Parishioners and Friends:

My mind goes to a different issue or thought everytime I read this Gospel. There are so many

aspects to think about. The foolish person doesn't always know when they are being foolish. Some very smart people sometimes do foolish things. The simplest view that I have of this story, is that God never asks us to do something that we are unable to do. If it is truly something we cannot do, God is not asking us to do it.

The foolish bridesmaids did not ask for money to go get the oil, so they cannot say they could not afford the oil. They asked oil from the the wise bridesmaids because they did buy the oil and had it with them. In a real wedding, the bride would only ask her bridesmaids do what she knows they are able to do. The bride would have given money or the oil to the person who could not afford to provide the oil to light the way to the groom's home.

From this we draw the conclusion that the foolish bridesmaids chose to keep the money rather than spend it on oil. God provides us with the grace and mercy to be able to enter heaven. Jesus uses stories of banquets to help us understand our invitation to enter the Heavenly Kingdom. If we do qualify to enter the Heavenly Kingdom, it is because of personal decisions we make.

I don't know what the reasons were for each one of them to decide to not spend the money, or want to carry the oil. The honest person would admit that they didn't want to spend money on this event and would decline when they were asked. Some people want the position and title without the desire to actually carry out the responsibility.

I think is why the wise bridesmaids did not give them some of their oil. None of us have enough mercy and grace to bring salvation to another person. There is not a formula or way to save another by unsaving our self. The issue really isn't the oil, it is that sometimes a person does choose to not do what they have the ability to do. Everyone worships something, sometimes it is not God.

There is part of me that feels sorry for the foolish. They had to be devastated when they disovered that they couldn't enter late. They might have even wanted to blame the groom for coming so late. If the groom had come early they would not have run out of oil. They made an effort to go get the oil. They simply had miscalculated how long or "gambled wrongly" on how much they would need and for how long.

This is not a literal true story in the sense that we lose our salvation by messing up on wedding plans. It is about what can happen when we do not pay attention. As Jesus says, "keep awake". They more we don't pay attention to what is important and become increasingly distracted from what is good by what is evil the more likely we will fail to be there when the saved enter.

In the concrete day to day life, the more often a person is intoxicated or absorbed in constant texting while driving, the probablity of being in an accident increases. Life is filled with decisions that make our life more difficult or easier, healthier or less healthy, more in harmony with the will of God or in rebellion. There comes a time when our decisions have taken us so far from God, that we simply are not there with Him.

No one is abandoned by God, we can abandon Him. We can fall asleep with oil or without oil. Sometimes we can get confused that the desire to enter the wedding banquet means you get to enter. We actually have to use our gifts according to what He has given to us to do His will.

The beauty of the 7 Mysteries/Sacraments is that our beliefs are in a ritual where we are not living through imagination and abstract emotions, but something concreted to see, feel, and touch, like the oil of the wise they keep us ready for the groom.
