Mark 2:1-12 When Jesus returned to Capernaum after some days, it became known that he was at home. Many gathered together so that there was no longer room for them, not even around the door, and he preached the word to them. They came bringing to him a paralytic carried by four men. Unable to get near Jesus because of the crowd, they opened up the roof above him. After they had broken through, they let down the mat on which the paralytic was lying. When Jesus saw their faith, he said to the paralytic, "Child, your sins are forgiven." Now some of the scribes were sitting there asking themselves, "Why does this man speak that way? He is blaspheming. Who but God alone can forgive sins?" Jesus immediately knew in his mind what they were thinking to themselves, so he said, "Why are you thinking such things in your hearts? easier, to say to the paralytic, 'Your sins are forgiven,' or to say, 'Rise, pick up your mat and walk'? But that you may know that the Son of Man has authority to forgive sins on earth" — he said to the paralytic, "I say to you, rise, pick up your mat, and go home." He rose, picked up his mat at once. and went away in the sight of everyone. They were

all astounded and glorified God, saying, "We have never seen anything like this."

Dear Parishioners and Friends:

It is not wise to tear someone's roof apart but it does get the point across. For the longest time I had this image of them up on the roof tearing it open. Actually if I had lived there, I would know that as this newer translation says, "they opened up the roof" meaning that many roofs had little doors to go up on the roof to dry food to preserve it for later. Even so, hoisting up a grown man up to a roof and then lowering him down was no easy task. We can ask our self, what kind of effort do we make to bring someone closer to Jesus, because we know He is a healer.

How many "roofs" do we have blocking out the will of God for our lives? Staying close to the Lord is not always easy; believing in His power is even more of a challenge. It is difficult to change our life style even when we know it will make us a more healthy and happy person in the future. We struggle to give up the short-lived pleasure of certain foods and behaviors even when we know it is not good for us. Good friends help us get through our barriers. When we really trust someone, and are able to share our

deepest thoughts, our barriers and challenges come

into the healing light. Friends that are true and concerned about what is best for us, encourage us to grow toward the Lord and grow in physical and spiritual health. They are not afraid to challenge us. Forgiving sins is difficult because we have to face and admit we need forgiveness. When we are hurt our emotions do not tell us to forgive, but to get even or nurture the hurt rather than the healing. Faith asks us to use our will and beliefs rather than our impulse to attack or run away.

Most serious illnesses are obvious and the discomfort and pain thrusts us forward to plea for a remedy to find relief and healing. The pain of sin is not nearly as obvious as physical pain, and so we are tempted to ignore our spiritual and moral health. Keep nurturing the Faith, trust in the Lord and He will bring us to the light. Jesus is a Divine light that opens the path to wholeness. Let not let the shadows of the sins and failings of others we encounter on this path confuse us and discourage to continue this living path.

Questions regarding the Maronite Traditions

Over the years I was asked a variety of questions, regarding the Liturgy, here are some samples.

Why do we stand during the Words of Institution and the calling down of the Holy Spirit during the prayers that turn the Bread and Wine into the Body and Blood of our Savior?

The oldest Traditions of the Church were to stand, it is not exactly certain when kneeling became customary in the Catholic Church of the Latin Rite, the Catholic Church of the Eastern Rites did not switch to the kneeling rubric unless they were in recent centuries pressured, or "wanting to fit it" when they immigrated to places where the Latin Church was the majority.

The tradition of the Eastern Church is to stand as a sign of readiness for the return of Jesus the Messiah. This reference of faith is still found emphatically in all the Liturgies of the Apostolic Churches. The priest is leading the way to the New Jerusalem to greet the return of the Savior. For many centuries all churches were designed so that the worshipers faced east, the direction in which Christ returns from. This also symbolized the rising sun, the raised Son. We now refer this facing the Liturgical East when it is not possible to build facing East.

When we are being led, the leader does not walk backwards, but forward. This is why up until just recently the priest at the altar faced the same direction as the congregation because all were praying facing Liturgically East, leading to the Heavenly Jerusalem our final

destination on the journey back into the place of paradise. Once we were evicted from the Garden of Eden and now we are returning.
