Luke 15:11-32 "There was a man who had two sons. The younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of the property that will belong to me.' So he divided his property between them. A few days later the younger son gathered all he had and traveled to a distant country, and there he squandered his property in dissolute living. When he had spent everything, a severe famine took place throughout that country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him to his fields to feed the pigs. He would gladly have filled himself with the pods that the pigs were eating; and no one gave him anything. But when he came to himself he said, 'How many of my father's hired hands have bread enough and to spare, but here I am dying of hunger! I will get up and go to my father, and I will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son; treat me like one of your hired hands." So he set off and went to his father. But while he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him. Then the son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you; I am no longer worthy to be called your son.' But the father said to his slaves, 'Quickly, bring out a robe — the best one — and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. And get the fatted calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate; for this son of mine was dead and is alive again; he was lost and is found!'

And they began to celebrate. "Now his elder son was in the field; and when he came and approached the house, he heard music and dancing. He called one of the slaves and asked what was going on. He replied, 'Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fatted calf, because he has got him back safe and sound.' Then he became angry and refused to go in. His father came out and began to plead with him. But he answered his father, 'Listen! For all these years I have been working like a slave for you, and I have never disobeyed your command; yet you have never given me even a young goat so that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came back, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fatted calf for him!' Then the father said to him, 'Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. But we had to celebrate and rejoice, because this brother of yours was dead and has come to life; he was lost and has been found."

Dear Parishioners and Friends:

Today's Gospel is a favorite for many reasons. We want to see God as a loving Father who will forgive us and take us back like a son or daughter. He respects our free will even if we choose to run away from him and live a destructive immoral life. We tend to appreciate being able to assert our free will, but not the free will of others when they use it in a manner that hurts us.

The father did not go to the foreign land and drag his son back. His father allowed him to squander his life. This cannot be understood as acceptance and the will of his father. Which means that this son without coming to his senses and repenting and stopping this living this way, he would die outside of the father's embrace and home.

Sometimes with some children, the parent cannot rescue them from their destructive life. With all the wishful desires in the world, the father and mother cannot bring their child to come to his or her senses to embrace the path of truth that sets one free. It is the child's rejection not the parents.

This son began to desire what is fit for only an animal. How often what seems to satisfy our thirst and cravings, becomes what degrades and destroys. Sin is what ever distorts what is good. It is lies that lead us to make choices that degrade our image without us believing or knowing that it is happening. This son could have chosen to never return to his father's embrace and be restored to his former position of a son of a loving father.

Thank God he remembered what his father taught him: that even as a slave his life would be better. How joyous to discover his Father was even more wonderful then what he remembered.

The angry older son had to discover the value of what he already had. Some of the most miserable people are those who have far more than they need, and can only focus on what cause them to feel less than what they are and have. This type of distortion can be even more painful than physical starvation because "all the food in the world" cannot fill them. True hunger and thirst is satisfied in a right relationship with the Heavenly Father. **Aboona**

GREAT FRIDAY, April 3, marks the end of Lent. Abstinence from meat is observed on all the Fridays of Lent by all faithful from the ages of 18 to 65.

Fasting from all food and drink (except water and medicine) is to be observed from midnight until noon on Great Friday of the Crucifixion. Optional would be the traditional abstinence from meat on Wednesdays.

Those who are unable to fast because of health must perform other penances and acts of charity.
