Mark 5:21-34.

When Jesus had crossed again [in the boat] to the other side, a large crowd gathered around him, and he stayed close to the sea. One of the synagogue officials, named Jairus, came forward. Seeing him he fell at his feet and pleaded earnestly with him, saying, "My daughter is at the point of death. Please, come lay your hands on her that she may get well and live." He went off with him, and a large crowd followed him and pressed upon him. There was a woman afflicted with hemorrhages for twelve years. She had suffered greatly at the hands of many doctors and had spent all that she had. Yet she was not helped but only grew worse. She had heard about Jesus and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his cloak. She said, "If I but touch his clothes, I shall be cured." Immediately her flow of blood dried up. She felt in her body that she was healed of her affliction. Jesus, aware at once that power had gone out from him, turned around in the crowd and asked, "Who has touched my clothes?" But his disciples said to him, "You see how the crowd is pressing upon you, and yet you ask, 'Who touched me?' " And he looked around to see who The woman, realizing what had had done it.

happened to her, approached in fear and trembling. She fell down before Jesus and told him the whole truth. He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has saved you. Go in peace and be cured of your affliction."

Dear Parishioners and Friends:

Jarius was willing to be humble in his approach to Jesus. He was officially a religious leader in an organized religion. He was Jewish like Jesus, and on the level of status outranked Jesus. He understood something that made it possible to have his daughter healed; he didn't care about his position, he cared about the healing power that Jesus was sharing with those who came to Him.

We need this example to remind us that we should never try to outrank Jesus by not letting him into our lives. We are saying we "outrank" Him when we have seven Sabbaths and He has none, or profane His name, put other things (idols) before Him, or treat others and ourselves with deceit.

On the way to heal a child, a woman lets Jesus be more powerful than the many discouragements and disappointments she experienced over the years. She wanted only to touch the tassel of His clothes. That touch was all she felt she needed and it would be enough. And it was enough.

Through no fault of her own, she had an image of herself as being unclean, unacceptable, and unworthy to get too close to what is holy, for she was bleeding and that made her too unclean to pray in the synagogue or to be touched. If she were touched, the other person would need a purification ceremony.

She was scared, even with touching the furthest edge of the garment, and not even that, but the tassels that hang from the edge of the garment. Even so, power flowed out unlimited, uninhibited, and unafraid of this situation. She was healed, she was no longer unclean, and she was now acceptable.

Healing of the body is not all that Jesus is concerned about. In fact, He is more concerned about what is within the heart and soul. Jesus wanted to know this woman, wanted to know her story and she came to Him trembling with fear and fell before Him. She told Him the whole truth and because of this, she could leave in peace cured beyond just the physical, but within the spirit also.

We come before Jesus, and the more truthful we dare to be with Him regarding our sins, and feelings of being unclean and bleeding with turmoil, the more it can be replaced with His peace. We can go in peace cured of what affliction it is that brought us suffering.

There is no caste system, we are all touchable, and His power will flow in through the total truth we surrender to Him. No matter how big the crowd, He knows you by name and how you need to be touched in a healing way. **Aboona**

LENTEN REGULATIONS

GREAT FRIDAY, April 3, marks the end of Lent. Abstinence from meat is observed on all the Fridays of Lent by all faithful from the ages of 18 to 65. Fasting from all food and drink (except water and medicine) is to be observed from midnight until noon on Great Friday of the Crucifixion. Optional would be the traditional abstinence from meat on Wednesdays.

Those who are unable to fast because of health must perform other penances and acts of charity.
