Luke 18:9-14

Jesus also told this parable to some who trusted in themselves that they were righteous and regarded others with contempt: "Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee, standing by himself, was praying thus, 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people: thieves, roques, adulterers, or even like this tax collector. I fast twice a week; I give a tenth of all my income.' But the tax collector, standing far off, would not even look up to heaven, but was beating his breast and saying, 'God, be merciful to me, a sinner!' I tell you, this man went down to his home justified rather than the other; for all who exalt themselves will be humbled, but all who humble themselves will be exalted."

Dear Parishioners and Friends:

It is easy to forget at the time that Jesus is telling these stories, to be a Pharisee was an honorable and admirable religious group to belong to. They were well educated at a time when few people could read or write. They could quote the scriptures expertly and many followed their teachings and interpretation of the Scriptures, they were even considered progressive by some in the fact they did believe in life after death.

Today we equate being a Pharisee with being judgmental and self-righteous because of these Gospel stories. These Gospel stories are no longer literally about the Pharisees but about anyone who is considered to be very religious, but lacks the inner qualities of humility and compassion. They know and quote many Scripture verses and push for laws based on their understanding of God, might even quote about the compassion of God, but you are very unlikely to experience it from them.

We have to be careful to not reject good and wholesome qualities that are also in the plan of God just because some other qualities are missing. Jesus Himself told His Disciples to fast, in fact there were some types of evil that can only be overcome through fasting and prayer.

To give ten percent was God's command in the Old Covenant. In the New Covenant the focus is not the percentage, but according to one's means, we are called to give sacrificially and through this we learn

the wisdom of self-control and disciplined spending. There are reasons why a person is able to give less, and for some reasons why they can give more.

Virtue should be our priority, our financial generosity includes our talents and time. When God is first in our life and is the object of our worship we can be refreshed by living out our faith through worship and action. We can fall into habits and "want seeking" that in its ends leaves us in an exhausted feeling like a rat running a losing race.

The Pharisee made the disastrous mistake of thinking his own evaluation of himself could justify himself with a comparison of his morality with another's. He was a good man, but redemption comes through the mercy and grace of a Savior. In everything Jesus says, He is asking us to be good to others for He is the other.

In this man's concern for the sins he listed, hopefully he came to experience and believe that Jesus transforms the sinner into the virtuous. The tax collector found salvation because he realized that the way he was living was wrong. He did not present a list of reasons to justify his wrongdoing. He was sorry, and prayed for the grace to stop. It is the Spirit of holiness that transforms our heart and mind to be open to live according to the will of the Father.

Demonizing others is no solution to the ills of the world. Bringing the Light of the Gospel to the darkness in our life and the lives of others is the message He continually teaches. Using the wrong medicine to treat a person's illness does not heal them. The most difficult challenge of today is convincing the self-righteous and the sinner to embrace the solution Jesus provides. **Aboona**

Death of Msgr. James Khoury:

Year of Mercy

Dear Brother Priests, Deacons, Subdeacons, Religious Men and Women, Lay Faithful:

We received the sad news that Monsignor James T. Khoury passed away in Flordia, on Tuesday, August 16, at the age of 72. He was predeceased by his parents, Emil and Frances, and his sister Patricia Murphy. Monsignor Khoury was born in Lawrence, Massachusetts and was ordained a priest on October 11, 1975 by Archbishop Francis M. Zavek.

Following his ordination, he served as parochial vicar at Saint Joseph Church in Waterville, Maine; and pastor at Saint George Church in San Antonio, Texas; Saint Joseph Church in Olean, New York; Saint Maron Church in Youngstown, Ohio; and his home parish of Saint Anthony Church in Lawrence, Massachusetts. He was elevated to the dignity of Periodeut with the title of Monsignor in 1995.

Monsignor Khoury is survived by his brother Brian, and his sisters, Joan Charest, Eileen Khoury, and Sheila Deeb, as well as nieces and nephews, and many relatives and friends.

At this time, funeral arrangements are pending but we will inform of them as soon as possible.

I extend the sympathies and prayers of the entire Eparchy of Saint Maron of Brooklyn - clergy, religious and laity - to Monsignor Khoury's family and friends. May he rest in peace!
