Luke 8:1-15

Jesus went on through cities and villages, proclaiming and bringing the good news of the kingdom of God. The twelve were with him, as well as some women who had been cured of evil spirits and infirmities: Mary, called Magdalene, from whom seven demons had gone out, and Joanna, the wife of Herod's steward Chuza, and Susanna, and many others, who provided for them out of their resources.

When a great crowd gathered and people from town after town came to him, he said in a parable: "A sower went out to sow his seed; and as he sowed, some fell on the path and was trampled on, and the birds of the air ate it up. Some fell on the rock; and as it grew up, it withered for lack of moisture. Some fell among thorns, and the thorns grew with it and choked it. Some fell into good soil, and when it grew, it produced a hundredfold." As he said this, he called out, "Let anyone with ears to hear listen!"

Then his disciples asked him what this parable meant. He said, "To you it has been given to know the secrets of the kingdom of God; but to others I speak in parables,

so that 'looking they may not perceive, and listening they may not understand.' "Now the parable is this:

The seed is the word of God. The ones on the path are those who have heard; then the devil comes and takes away the word from their hearts, so that they may not believe and be saved. The ones on the rock are those who, when they hear the word, receive it with joy. But these have no root; they believe only for a while and in a time of testing fall away. As for what fell among the thorns, these are the ones who hear; but as they go on their way, they are choked by the cares and riches and pleasures of life, and their fruit does not mature. But as for that in the good soil, these are the ones who, when they hear the word, hold it fast in an honest and good heart, and bear fruit with patient endurance."

Dear Parishioners and Friends:

The Kingdom of God, is not the same as the earthly kingdom we are experiencing now. A common danger is to think that there is no need for us to be open or even hear the word of God. We have trouble identifying what is fertile ground for the good wheat to sprout and provide a nutritious meal of peace and security. One of the greatest threats to the message of peace, is the growing attitude that the followers of Jesus and the multiple and sometimes contradictory interpretations of the Gospel are responsible for the lack of peace and security.

When we fail to do what makes the ground fertile. When we fail to believe in the importance of the seed to be planted. When we ignore and deny the damage and effect of loving riches and pleasures over the value of protecting the growing wheat of faith the transformation of the broken hearted and hurting ends. What happens is the broken and downtrodden not experiencing the authentic living of the faith become susceptible to a different kingdom; the kingdom of death instead of life. We are witnessing the withering of the good and the sprouting of the evil.

When Jesus tells the meaning of the parable, He obviously believes there is an evil power ready and willing to snatch His message from their heart. That implies that a person could have personally received the message in his or her heart, but remains there briefly. We don't lose freewill when we accept the Word of God, nor are we held against our will. Like the story of Adam and Eve, we can be fooled to accept what is false about God and through misinformed arguments we can be led from the truth.

Sometimes we worship the joy we felt, like a mood altering experience, the focus is too lopsided on the entertainment, feel good, rather than the endurance of patience of following even when it is difficult. Christianity is not what we "get out of it" but what can transform and change us by Mercy and Compassion. Too many people give up, letting the thorns and trials of life drive them away rather than strengthening them into a mature living of the faith.

Jesus transforms the good wheat into His Body, and His Body through the Eucharist transforms us into Him. Not that we become a duplicate of Jesus, but that our lives are meant to manifest His power over evil, His light over darkness.

To neglect the Word of God, to not provide a fertile ground for the seed of faith to be planted, to not learn how to survive among the thorns and rocks; the world we leave will be one starved ravenously feeding on evil and an endless litany of grievances of hate against one another. To know truth from the Giver of truth is necessary to conquer the giver of falsehood.

The successful farmer is the one that knows what is harmful to his plants and what is beneficial and acts upon this knowledge. **Aboona**
