Luke 4:14-21

Then Jesus, filled with the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding country.

He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone. When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the Sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read, and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him.

He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring good news to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor."

And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to say to them, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing."

Dear Parishioners and Friends: (from a previous reflection)

Wouldn't it be great to hear someone read the Scriptures and then say? "What I have read is fulfilled?" Well, the vast majority of the time what we do hear in the Scriptures is fulfilled. God did send His beloved Son into the world so that we would find eternal life. God declares the method of rescue; now it is up to us to put faith in that message and follow

Today, Jesus reveals the part of the message that reveals some of the reasons He was sent to us then, and is still with us now. Bring good news to the poor. What would be good for someone who is poor to hear? The possibilities are endless.

For those shackled by addictions and emotional behaviors that bring hurt and pain to themselves and those around them; to be released from that bondage certainly is good news. To feel hope and confidence that the storms of life will make you stronger.

For those with physical ailments, recovery is indeed a divine hope. For all of us, in some way God has a message of transformation and a fulfilling direction that brings into our life a power that fills a type of emptiness that only God knows the right remedy for each individual.

Being in Church on the Sabbath, is an act of faith and consent to believing the "report" about Him. If we believe that the world as we know it needs

transformation and healing, then our next step is to search out ways to make the message of Jesus known and accepted.

The Holy Spirit comes upon the Bread and the Wine in order for it to be transformed into His Body and Blood. We are transformed when our faith is fed through our altar call to come forward to receive Him into our lives.

God created a beautiful and wonderful world for us to enjoy and find inspiration and meaning. We cannot let these be a substitute though for the author of creation. Only through the Sacrifice of Calvary, which is renewed on the Altar, do we see the glimpse of the eternal blessing and the Thanksgiving that He personally asks from each of us.

As wonderful as creation is, it cannot finally end the evil that eats away at our own attempts to form a just and compassionate society. It is God's grace and mercy flowing through His teachings that offers the lasting hope and restful peace for those who put their faith in Him.

August 24 – Kickoff Supper for the Endowment Fund. George Mitchell will be attending and share his experience of growing up here at St. Joseph's. We will also officially recognize our "new members".

A recent survey has compiled all of the qualities that people want in the "PERFECT PRIEST". Here we share some of them with you. Results of a computerized survey indicate that the perfect priest preached exactly 12 minutes. He frequently condemns sin, but never upsets anyone. He works from 7am to midnight, and is also an accountant. He makes \$60 a week, wears good clothes, reads good books, drives a good car, and gives about \$50 a week to the poor.
