Luke 24: 36-48

While they were talking, Jesus himself stood among them and said to them, "Peace be with you." They were startled and terrified, and thought that they were seeing a ghost. He said to them, "Why are you frightened, and why do doubts arise in your hearts? Look at my hands and my feet; see that it is I myself. Touch me and see; for a ghost does not have flesh and bones as you see that I have." And when he had said this, he showed them his hands and his feet. While in their joy they were disbelieving and still wondering, he said to them, "Have you anything here to eat?" They gave him a piece of grilled fish, and he took it and ate in their presence. Then he said to them, "These are my words that I spoke to you while I was still with you — that everything written about me in the law of Moses, the prophets, and the psalms must be fulfilled." Then he opened their minds to understand the Scriptures, and he said to them, "Thus it is written, that the Messiah is to suffer and to rise from the dead on the third day, and that repentance and forgiveness of sins is to be proclaimed in his name to all nations, beginning from Jerusalem. You are witnesses of these things."

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

(This is from a previous year.)

We are still reading about the first followers of Jesus struggling with doubt and fear. He still wants them to proclaim to the whole world that He is the Messiah. That He was raised from the dead and through repentance and forgiveness of sins those who believe what they proclaim, will have eternal life.

The Scriptures that Jesus speaks of is the Old Testament, the New Testament is not yet written. Even though both Testaments now exist, that does not mean that any particular individual can read them and understand them correctly; if this were true, all the churches would reunite instead of continuing to divide. Again, Jesus shows that for there to be one church, apostolic authority has to be accepted.

In this opening of their minds to the understanding of Scriptures they can witness Christ's message to all nations because it completes, corrects, and fulfills what all other religions attempt to accomplish. This always implies that for the individual Christian, he or she continues to need correction, and a growing knowledge and understanding of the Scriptures. Others will not accept the Gospel, if we cannot witness a more loving and spiritually transforming life than what they already have.

When a person has a superficial and uninformed understanding of the Christian faith, what they witness more often than not, is that it is irrelevant and unnecessary to worship God through a Christ centered, biblically ordained manner.

When we ignore the spirit of Christ, our spirit can began to embrace and fixate on ever increasing messages of negativity and even diabolical deeds. We see this in the news with ISIS, marginalized and feeling lost, a form of belief that capitalizes on this to create actions we can hardly comprehend in a civilized society. Society can loose its soul when they abandon living Christ's message.

Every generation needs to keep growing in their understanding of Christ with the Scriptures and prayer. Even for the Apostles, each day, each week, each year, was an unfolding of more truth, less fear, more faith, less doubt. One should assume that even the church, and individually, we are a work-in-process toward the fullness of the teachings. Each of us chooses to be a part of the vine that is bearing fruit or dying off because we no longer feed upon Him.

For a growing number, this work in process in grasping and accepting the fullness of faith is being rejected. Atheism is growing among the youth; if not atheism, then indifference toward religion. We will soon know what impact this will have on our culture. To be indifferent about fully living and teaching what Jesus gave His life for has serious impact and throughout human history we can see the consequences.
