"Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed."

John 20:24-31

Thomas, called Didymus, one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples said to him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands and put my finger into the nail marks and put my hand into his side, I will not believe." Now a week later his disciples were again inside and Thomas was with them. Jesus came, although the doors were locked, and stood in their midst and said, "Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands, and bring your hand and put it into my side, and do not be unbelieving, but believe." Thomas answered and said to him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you come to believe because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and have believed." Conclusion: Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of [his] disciples that are not written in this book. But these are written that you may [come to] believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through this belief you may have life in his name.

Dear Parishioners and Friends:

Even now billions still do not believe in the Incarnation, that God, the Eternal Word would take on the flesh of our humanity. He who is sinless became sin and embraced death so that we can become free of sin and have eternal life. This is a scandal and sounds like a failure to many. It is obvious that we do not truly accept or want to see ourselves as we truly are, otherwise there would not be multibillion-dollar industries responding to our desire to feel and look better than what we see in the mirror. Our desire to numb our senses or intensify them supplies billions to those trafficking in illegal products. There is even the trafficking of people. Not everything that improves our sense of well-being is necessarily always wrong. Like anything else; all creation is created good, but we are capable of misusing what is created.

God loves us, and He loves the world, this is why He sent His Son. His love is only limited by our rejecting Him. He became us, so we can become Him. In the Eastern Church this is called Divinization. Not that we become a God, but that we inherit all that He has by grace and mercy. With Him, we are raised up like Him. Our death, our wounds lose the ability to cause us pain.

The importance of this Gospel reading is to witness that Jesus truly was crucified and He did die, and now is raised up in glory. He touched wounds that rob a body of life, yet becomes a body now living in glory.

Based on history and the present constant global news, revenge, hatred and anger is the message of the world. If the world were following the message of Jesus, the world we live in would be a very different place. Jesus didn't hide his scars, nor terrorize the families, country or culture in which those responsible came from. He didn't take the scars, flaws and hurts of any family, country, or culture and demean them to be less than what He knows He can lift anyone who lives by His grace and mercy.

The wounds of Jesus were the proof that Thomas asked to believe that Jesus was alive because he knew He had died. He was a witness that Jesus was a healer and a forgiver of sins. Jesus didn't have to hide His wounds, because they brought Him no shame or pain any longer. In fact, He showed His wounds to witness His mission of the price and the victory of salvation.

We all carry the wounds of our humanity. No one can be born without knowing pain. From the beginning of our existence in the womb, with our first breath and our last, we sometimes experience pain without understanding why and where it comes from. Jesus after experiencing the heart wrenching pain of physical, spiritual, and psychological distress, left it all behind Him and chose to forgive the thief and His tormentors.

For us, He shows His wounds, to demonstrate to us, that no matter how life may have scarred us, for all eternity the scars can no longer bring us pain, not to our body, not to our spirit, and not to our mind. Like Jesus, when we die with Him and live for Him, our scars exist in peace; no longer able to bring us shame, no longer a mark that would make others uncomfortable. We can see the power of God's love and compassion triumphing over death and sin.

Thomas touched the wounds, but Jesus was not there for sympathy, but to build faith. We win what He won when we run the race with Him. **Aboona**
