Mark 10:46-52.

They came to Jericho. And as he was leaving Jericho with his disciples and a sizable crowd, Bartimaeus, a blind man, the son of Timaeus, sat by the roadside begging. On hearing that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to cry out and say, "Jesus, son of David, have pity on me." And many rebuked him, telling him to be silent. But he kept calling out all the more, "Son of David, have pity on me." Jesus stopped and said, "Call him." So they called the blind man, saying to him, "Take courage; get up, he is calling you." He threw aside his cloak, sprang up, and came to Jesus. Jesus said to him in reply, "What do you want me to do for you?" The blind man replied to him, "Master, I want to see." Jesus told him, "Go your way; your faith has saved you." Immediately he received his sight and followed him on the way.

Dear Parishioners and Friends:

Bartimaeus heard about Jesus and when he found out that Jesus was coming by, he began to yell out to Him. He was blind, so he had to have heard others talking about Him. One might wonder why many people rebuked him for yelling out for Jesus. I sometimes wonder in what way we rebuke people now who are calling out to Him, people who really need Him, but because they make us uncomfortable in their approach we try to stop them.

We do not always notice or comprehend another person's confusing behavior as a sign they are looking for God's love and attention. Many times rebuking someone means that they are disturbing us. When something really bothers us, we can approach with an attitude of rejection, denial, prejudice, anything but as a way of being closer to God.

We must keep calling out past rebukes, those of others and the ones redirected at our self. He fought back, and because of that, he has an experience of being able to see, and enjoying it in such a manner that goes beyond many others who were always able to see.

Bartimaeus threw aside his cloak. Maybe there are things that we need to throw aside and act with courage. It just could be the reason we are not seeing life clearly is because there is some experience we are clinging to that is holding us back. A person, who always covers up their real self, cannot find himself. Opening oneself with total trust and confidence in the Lord is a healing process. Bartimaeus did call out, was willing to be vulnerable, and now he can see. It takes courage! It takes faith! There are some things that need to be thrown to the side but you must keep calling out and you will see! To trust Jesus is a wise choice.

Faith does save us because we act on a supernatural level. Without seeing how Jesus is going to work "your" miracle we follow His steady hand, knowing that His leading always takes us closer to a holy and healthier place. Take courage and follow Him.

Have you ever noticed when you watch a movie again, you are able to notice events that you didn't see the first time? Walking with faith enables us to see more deeply into the purpose and joy of life. We see better after we forgive and let go of hurts. Is it easy? No, but the journey is worth it. Sometimes we are the one that keeps our eyes tightly closed because of fear or judgments.

Anger, bitterness, resentment; all of these things rob us of the light of peace. Jesus is always saying don't be afraid, have courage. Just that alone allows us to begin to see more intensely, and more clearly. So often it is our own decisions that keep us from seeing the beauty of life because we are not open to the blessing in which God has planned for you and I. We blind ourselves with our imperfections and ignore God's healing power. **Aboona**
