

John 1:29-34 – Sunday after Epiphany

The next day John saw Jesus coming toward him and declared, "Here is the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world! This is he of whom I said, 'After me comes a man who ranks ahead of me because he was before me.' I myself did not know him; but I came baptizing with water for this reason, that he might be revealed to Israel." And John testified, "I saw the Spirit descending from heaven like a dove, and it remained on him. I myself did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptize with water said to me, 'He on whom you see the Spirit descend and remain is the one who baptizes with the Holy Spirit.' And I myself have seen and have testified that this is the Son of God."

Dear Parishioners and friends,

John, the Baptizer drew large crowds preaching the need to repent, get right with God and be prepared for the coming of the Messiah. One of the dangers of becoming famous and popular is for a person's ego and pride to take over and focus on themselves to stay successful. We all know people who have let this happen in their life. John could have perceived Jesus as a threat to his popularity and interpret the growing influence of Jesus in a manner that would

make him jealous and resentful. John kept faithful to his calling, to the message he was born to preach; prepare the hearts of his people to be receptive to the coming Messiah.

Scripture quotes John saying the he must decrease while the ministry of Jesus increases. The greatness of John is undisputed in Church history. It isn't that there was a decrease for John, but rather accepting in knowing that a reflection of the, true Light from true Light, by its very essence is totally dependent on the light.

John testifies that he saw the Spirit come down like a dove upon Jesus. A voice like thunder proclaimed that Jesus was the beloved Son of whom the Father is well pleased. We are baptized in the Holy Spirit, making us God's children. This is all the greatness we need to experience joy and peace. This is not obvious at the time of Baptism, it becomes obvious when we remain faithful to our relationship with Jesus, which provides the loving atmosphere in which the baptized will experience these loving relationships.

We do have a tendency to want some other form of greatness. Some greatness is good, but when it becomes an identity, competing and replacing the

identity God gives us by calling us His son or daughter, we are decreasing the spiritual power of God over us. In a mystical way, through our commitment to living out the power and guidance of the Holy Spirit we received, we can reflect the Light of Christ into the darkness of the world. Those baptized as a baby may have not personally and consciously chosen to become a child of the loving Father, but neither did they choose to be a child of their parents.

As a person matures in their ability to make decisions freely, a child can reject God and their parents. Those who experience love and are surrounded by love have a far better chance to choose to continue to surround themselves with this love.

John prepared the way for Jesus as a prophet, in a manner all the reflections of humanity, when guided by the desire to love and be loved in a healing healthy manner prepares the way for the salvation that comes through the message and deeds of Jesus.

We should count it a blessing that there is such a thing as preparing the way for us to know Jesus. Most of us are Christians because the way was prepared for us through the faith of our parents. The knowledge they insist we know about Jesus, reflects their relationship with Him. Our relationship and perception of God is sometimes linked with how much trust and confidence we have in what our parents believe.

Another dimension of preparing the way is like the story of the Good Seed. John's preaching of repentance broke up the hardened ground of the path, removed the rock and thorns, and created fertile ground. Jesus went into the water because He was humble. He knew that people might think He was in the water because He did some bad things, however, He took that chance so that all water could be sanctified to sanctify all that water touches.

Jesus now prepares the water for us making it possible to become His Father's children. Baptism is an acknowledgment that we, as a believing community, want our sins forgiven and washed away to never again distort and make lasting peace and joy distorted and unreachable.

It was a clear and direct command of Jesus that His followers go out to the four corners of the world to teach all nations all that He taught them and baptize them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. This is what the church continues to do since accepting His will over 2,000 years ago.
