Luke 8:40-56

When Jesus returned, the crowd welcomed him, for they were all waiting for him. Just then there came a man named Jairus, a leader of the synagogue. He fell at Jesus' feet and begged him to come to his house, for he had an only daughter, about twelve years old, who was dying. As he went, the crowds pressed in on him. Now there was a woman who had been suffering from hemorrhages for twelve years; and though she had spent all she had on physicians. no one could cure her. She came up behind him and touched the fringe of his clothes, and immediately her hemorrhage stopped. Then Jesus asked, "Who touched me?" When all denied it, Peter said, "Master, the crowds surround you and press in on you." But Jesus said, "Someone touched me; for I noticed that power had gone out from me." When the woman saw that she could not remain hidden, she came trembling; and falling down before him, she declared in the presence of all the people why she had touched him, and how she had been immediately healed. He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace."

While he was still speaking, someone came from the

leader's house to say, "Your daughter is dead; do not trouble the teacher any longer." When Jesus heard this, he replied, "Do not fear. Only believe, and she will be saved." When he came to the house, he did not allow anyone to enter with him, except Peter, John, and James, and the child's father and mother. They were all weeping and wailing for her; but he said, "Do not weep; for she is not dead but sleeping." And they laughed at him, knowing that she was dead. But he took her by the hand and called out, "Child, get up!" Her spirit returned, and she got up at once. Then he directed them to give her something to eat. Her parents were astounded; but he ordered them to tell no one what had happened.

Dear Parishioners and Friends:

Some cultures still believe bleeding makes a person unclean, regardless of the reason, and needs to be purified through a ritual. Blood represents life, and the loss of blood is a form of dying. Since the doctors could not stop the bleeding, she was considered perpetually unclean and was not permitted to worship in the

temple. Jesus makes all creations clean, it is our actions in the use of creation that can be undlean.

All of us are in the same situation. No purification ritual, no doctor, no material possession, can replace what Jesus Christ can do for us by faith. We all can bleed to death if we do not respond to our wounds in a grace-filled way. Often this means we must study and learn the deeper meaning of life and God's message for life. The joy of living can flow out of us if we cannot find, or are unwilling to face, the causes of our wounds. His blood is life-giving and in our Catholic Faith, our belief in the words of Jesus, the blood "flows" back into us through the Eucharist.

The Eucharist is meant to be a living witness of our faith, our changed life, our actions of charity, hope, and faith. When we take the Eucharist as just some formality, Jesus is truly present, but we still have yet to be in a real life-giving relationship with Him.

Jesus was truly present to those who mumbled about His teaching of His Body and Blood being real food. The lack of their faith and belief prevented the real message of salvation to transform their lives and hearts.

Reach out to His power! Faith in Him saves us, cures us from our afflictions. Faith is a gift, a power that has to be used in order to keep growing in faith. Faith is not memorized facts about Him; they can't get us through the crises of life. From her wounded heart, the woman told Jesus everything and her everything, good and bad gave her a new life cleansed and free. **Aboona**

LENTEN REGULATIONS

Abstinence from meat is observed on all the Fridays of Lent by all faithful from the ages of 18 to 65.

Fasting from all food and drink (except water and medicine) is to be observed from midnight until noon on Ash Monday and Great Friday of the Crucifixion. Optional would be the traditional abstinence from meat on Wednesdays.

Those who are unable to fast because of health must perform other penances and acts of charity.

Church Etiquette

Refrain from long and loud conversations, **no food or drinks in church**, no leaving of pews during the reading of the Gospel and the Consecration of the Bread and Wine. Check to see if your cell phone is off.
