


Luke 12:42-48

"Who then is the faithful and prudent manager whom his master will put in charge of his slaves, to give them their allowance of food at the proper time? Blessed is that slave whom his master will find at work when he arrives. Truly I tell you, he will put that one in charge of all his possessions. But if that slave says to himself, 'My master is delayed in coming,' and if he begins to beat the other slaves, men and women, and to eat and drink and get drunk, the master of that slave will come on a day when he does not expect him and at an hour that he does not know, and will cut him in pieces, and put him with the unfaithful. That slave who knew what his master wanted, but did not prepare himself or do what was wanted, will receive a severe beating. But the one who did not know and did what deserved a beating will receive a light beating. From everyone to whom much has been given, much will be required; and from the one to whom much has been entrusted, even more will be demanded."

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

Even at this time in history, there are groups that openly seek and sell slaves. Both Christianity and Islam have used their Sacred Texts to justify slavery. Today only extremists would justify this openly. Even here in America there is a grave problem in human trafficking.

Jesus often uses parables. He creates a story in order to address the reality in which he finds us living. Whatever those circumstances are; He gives a message of how to find freedom, grace, confidence, meaning, and purpose.

For some, their reality is living in a situation where they are beaten and humiliated. Others live in the slavery of fear and anger which sometimes can be internalized or spill over in rage toward others.

The deeper we internalize the message that Jesus gives, we take ownership of the deepest forms of love for God, neighbor and self. The only slavery left is the all-consuming acts of virtue and loving compassion. What we ask of others is what we ask for ourselves, to find what is fulfilling, affirming, and

highly graced with joy that comes from believing in each person's dignity.

This gospel is about power; good power and abusive power. In this culture, at this time there is slavery. Jesus does make clear that all actions will be judged, and they will be judged based on the power we have over others and what we do with it.

Do you know what gifts he has given you? Do you know what God has called you to do? Have you allowed your behavior to reflect God being far from you or near?

When this gospel is chosen to be for "Sunday of the Priests", the image of the priest as being a chosen slave to give others all that is good from the Master to them. The priest is held high in his responsibility to serve others, and pass on to all that God wishes to give everyone. Many of our prayers point out that we are to inherit from God all He has, but to inherit it we have to know what are the requirements. In this particular Gospel; you better not be someone that abuses others.
