

THIS DAY'S GOSPEL: St. Luke 19; 1-10

He entered Jericho and was passing through. And there was a man named Zacchaeus; he was a chief tax collector, and rich. And he sought to see who Jesus was, but could not, on account of the crowd, because he was small of stature. So he ran on ahead and climbed up into a sycamore tree to see Him, for He was to pass that way. And when Jesus came to the place, He looked up and said to him, "Zacchaeus, make haste and come down, for I must stay at your house today." So he

made haste and came down, and received Him joyfully.

And when they saw it they all murmured, "He has gone in to be the guest of a man who is a sinner." And Zacchaeus stood and said to the Lord,

"Behold, Lord, the half of my goods I give to the poor; and if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I restore it fourfold."

And Jesus said to him, "Today salvation has come to this house, since he too is a son of Abraham. For the Son of man came to seek and to save the lost."

ABOONA'S WEEKLY REFLECTION

On August 4th we commemorate the holy nineteenth-century pastor of Ars, St. John-Marie Vianney. He was famously known for his prayer before the Most Holy and Blessed Sacrament of the Altar, preaching the truths of the Faith, and for his lifelong practice and example of fasting. He became for the modern world a new example of our ancient practices. From his direct personal experience he was able to say that "the works of penance abound in such delights and joys that once they have been tasted, nothing will ever again root them out of the soul Only the first steps are difficult for those who eagerly choose this path".

Continuing our considerations on fasting, it can be noted that the fast in antiquity would have abstained from all food until sundown, but in recent centuries this has been modified simply to noon, and water may be drunk. (This older practice we can still see today as practiced among Muslims during Ramadan, as they have adopted the regional classic fasting as it was in the seventh century.)

On stricter fastdays, there is no food even taken at noon and only one meal is consumed later in the day. (No food or drink, other than water, is known as a "black fast". This is practiced by some on the last days of the Great Week of the Passion.)

In lesser fasts, a *collation*, the equivalent of a sandwich or a bowl of soup can break the fast at noon, with the principal meal taken later in the evening.


In the eastern observance, there is no fasting on Saturdays or Sundays, but even these days during a fasting season keep to the abstinence from all meat and animal products.

Classically, a fast limits our intake abstaining from animals and animal products. This means that all animal meat (and a fish is a meat in this sense) and all animal products, including milk, cheese, eggs, etc., are also forgone. Yes, the "menu" of the traditional eastern fast is essentially what we call today "vegan".

These are the general norms set as to the *quantity* of foodstuffs as well as the *quality* of foods that we allow ourselves during a fast

We must train for this form of Christian discipline; no one will take on the whole form without preparation – especially not starting out from our modern indulgent lifestyle. Nevertheless, fasting has existed from well before the time of Our Lord, was practiced by Him and His Apostles, and has been treasured by the saints throughout the centuries as one of the finest forms of discipline, victory against the devil and source of self-knowledge as we train ourselves under grace in the path of the Gospel.

Fasting clarifies the mind and strengthens the will, allowing us to correspond better to the movements of the Hidden One's grace.

is a **Holy Day of Obligation.**


As a serious obligation, and thus under pain of mortal sin, we are to attend Mass on Holy Days of Obligation and to observe them as we would a Sunday.

WE MOURN THE PASSING HIS EXCELLENCY, THE MOST REVEREND ROBERT SHAHEEN, THE FIRST AMERICAN-BORN MARONITE PRIEST AND BISHOP

We send our condolences to his family and the clergy of the Eparchy of Our Lady of Lebanon, with the assurance of our prayers for him. May the Compassionate One shine His eternal light on His faithful servant.

Bishop Robert Joseph Shaheen died in St. Louis, MO on August 9. He was 80 years old, born June 3, 1937. He was the second Bishop of the Eparchy of Our Lady of Lebanon of Los Angeles and former pastor of St. Raymond Maronite Church in St. Louis, MO.



Bishop Shaheen will be buried from St. Anthony Maronite Church in Danbury, Connecticut (17 Granville Avenue, Danbury, CT 06810) on Monday, August 21 at 10:00 a.m. Visitation will be at the St. Anthony Church from 4:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. on Sunday, August 20.

Bishop Shaheen was a native of Danbury, CT. He was ordained in the United States in 1964 and was assigned as pastor of St. Raymond's in 1967. On December 5, 2000 Pope Saint John Paul II named Bishop Shaheen the second Bishop of the Eparchy. He retired in 2013.

"We pray for the repose of his soul, and give thanks to God for all of the lives that Bishop Shaheen has touched in his extraordinary life" said Bishop A. Elias Zaidan, current bishop and successor to Bishop Shaheen.

Robert was born to Albert and Aileen Shaheen. He attended St. Peter Grammar School and Danbury High School before entering St. Thomas Seminary in Bloomfield in 1955, in order to study for the Latin Church. In 1958, he transferred to the Eastern Rite and St. Basil Seminary in Methuen, Massachusetts, attending classes at St. Anselm College in Goffstown, New Hampshire.

After being ordained a Subdeacon (October 2, 1962) and Deacon (June 7, 1963), Bishop Shaheen was ordained a priest by Bishop Francis Mansour Zayek on May 2, 1964, at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception. Shortly after his ordination, he became pastor of St. Raymond's Church in St. Louis, Missouri, which had then been without a resident priest for over 20 years.

Under his leadership, St. Raymond's went from just a few faithful parishioners using a four-family apartment to a cathedral with hundreds of active families. From 1965 to 1970, he organized and celebrated Maronite Liturgies on a regular basis. He also developed newsletters, bulletins, and fliers; conducted a census to identify Maronites in the greater metropolitan area; and introduced spiritual and cultural programs, including Maronite religious education classes.

He hosted National Apostolate of Maronites Convention in 1970. Kicking-off a fund drive for new church in 1971, he later dedicated a new church in November 1975 and a new rectory in February 1977. He was ordained an archpriest in September 1978, and dedicated a new parish center "The Cedars" in November 1979.

On March 31, 1986, he was ordained a Chorbishop by Archbishop Zayek. He purchased additional property and buildings for future development as a Maronite retirement center and cultural center in 1991, and again hosted the National Apostolate of Maronites Convention in 1995.

On December 5, 2000, he was appointed Eparch of the Eparchy of Our Lady of Lebanon by Pope John Paul II, following the retirement of Our Lady of Lebanon's first bishop, John George Chedid. He was consecrated a bishop in the Saint Louis Cathedral on February 15, 2001 by Nasrallah Boutros Sfeir, the Patriarch of Antioch and All the East.

Bishop Shaheen's retirement became effective on July 10, 2013. Bishop A. Elias Zaidan, M.L.M. succeeded him as the third eparchial bishop of the Eparchy of Our Lady of Lebanon of Los Angeles. He died in St. Louis, MO on August 9, 2017. May he rest in peace and enter the eternal Light of Paradise.
