John 21:15-19

When they had finished breakfast, Jesus said to Simon Peter, "Simon son of John, do you love me more than these?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my lambs." A second time he said to him, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" He said to him, "Yes, Lord; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Tend my sheep."

He said to him the third time, "Simon son of John, do you love me?" Peter felt hurt because he said to him the third time, "Do you love me?" And he said to him, "Lord, you know everything; you know that I love you." Jesus said to him, "Feed my sheep."

"Very truly, I tell you, when you were younger, you used to fasten your own belt and to go wherever you wished. But when you grow old, you will stretch out your hands, and someone else will fasten a belt around you and take you where you do not wish to go." (He said this to indicate the kind of death by which he would glorify God.) After this he said to him, "Follow me."

Grace Burns

The great Saint Anthony once had a vision of doves flying up from the horizon, but being torn by

brambles – and by an ominous dark figure that clawed at them – as they struggled to ascend, bloodied by stressful wounds. He was given to understand that these doves were souls as they attempted to grow closer to God and make progress in the spiritual life. The life of grace costs much.

"Blessed is He Who has come, and will come again in the Name of the Lord". With these words from the liturgical Anaphora we are made to understand that the historical past of the Incarnation of the Word and His future coming in judgment are linked by the present day, and more importantly, how we use the time and grace that are now given to us. This expectation of the Day of Judgment is part of the very soul of the Syriac tradition. The Day of the Lord is the ultimate epiphany of great light in justice. Each of us will stand stripped bare of all before the Just Mercy of the Hidden One. Knowing this, how do I respond to the present moment of grace in my life? This world is passing. Grace never returns once it has been given. Do we accept the Hand of God when His compassion touches us?

The Catholic life of grace is meant to be a faithfully constant and consistent movement toward the just and last Day of Light. The gift of grace that allows us to surpass our normal and natural limits, and move toward the Light, comes to us from the Victorious Redeemer. In truth, it pushes us ever beyond our presumed limits, and into a greater goodness and generosity for which He created us. It smashes complacency. There is a huge pain factor in all this. This is the reason that so many modern people do not have the stamina or inclination to persevere in the practice of their religion. They are afraid of the light because it shines in too many dark corners of their lives. This gracious light strips away ignorance and forces us to confront the reality that God has established and desires to develop. This is the fundamental reason for the tearing and shredding that Saint Anthony beheld so many centuries ago in the desert.

Our greatest obstacles on this path are our assumptions, prejudgments, and suppositions that undergird our personal lives: our "comfort zone," as it were. We naturally try to construct a form of sweet cocoon around ourselves, but God loves us too much to acquiescence in this game of self-deception and ignorant complacency. Grace burns so that it might illuminate and we might see. The path of Calvary is set before us so that we might enter into the Resurrection.

Periodically then, all throughout our lives, we are each touched individually, and sometimes collectively, by this grace that is simultaneously loving and a consuming fire. These weeks, we of the Syro-Maronite community of St. Joseph's have been touched in just such a way. This is the Mystery of the Cross. In the Gospel, Death and Resurrection have been revealed as two facets of one divine Mystery and the manifestations of one single Plan of Salvation. Do we have the strength and will to respond positively to the purifying fire of God's divine Charity and accept the path of crucifixion so that we may be able to enter the Resurrection? The choice is ours to make, but we do know that to embrace the Cross is to be certain of the divine life to come from it. Two aspects, but one Providence; Easter is, after all, more than marshmallow peeps.

There is little that can be said in such moments, but nevertheless we must trust that an infinitely Good God, Who is substantially limitless Charity, governs, directs and guides all in His Wisdom – from the slightest measurable force in the universe to the highest scraph all are enveloped in a single divine plan. Through the darkness of Calvary we each are meant to arrive at the Resurrection. All of creation will be renewed on the Last Day, but as we recall, Saint Peter wrote that this will be accomplished "in fire."

We may feel betrayed, scandalized and/or repulsed by recent events – and all are saddened – but the loving wisdom of the "Bright-One-Who-cannot-be-clouded" intends to lead us to a more profound and truer understanding of these realities. In the future, as with many of the sad and hard events of our individual lives, I do believe we will look back and see this all as a time of grace. We are all, to varying degrees, being purged in our assumptions and strengthened in our sense of loyalty, affection, appreciation, gratitude and trust. Sometimes we are very conscious of God's work within us, and often not, but God is ever at work. There should be comfort in this thought.

In the end, we may feel torn and cut up these days, but we should be consoled in the knowledge that nothing is ever asked of us by God except that He provides the assistance for us to accomplish it. When God asks great things in our lives, and we perhaps wince at the prospect of the pain required, He grants even greater grace to see them through. Great sufferings reflecting Calvary announce great light and grace of the Resurrection. Who does not wish to live?

The Sacred Heart may ask us to walk through the torments of Calvary, but He Himself knows well that path, and He always remains at our side to steady our steps toward more abundant life, a life that is blessed and transformed, a life made greater by what it has been asked to undergo. By fire we are purified to resemble the white doves of Saint Anthony's vision, and by the light of that same fire we are made to see so that we might ascend to the hidden realm of Light and Life. "The Kingdom of Heaven is taken by violence, and the violent bear it away". Torn we may be, but that blood has the power to cleanse.

May God bless you all, and richly reward your generous perseverance under the cross. In this we may be certain of a bright future for our parish in the resurrection and grace to come.
