I Thessalonians 2: 1-13

And ye yourselves, my brethren, know our entrance among you, that it was not in vain: but we first suffered and were treated with indignity – as ye know – at Philippi;

and then, in a great agony, with confidence in our God, we addressed to you the gospel of the Messiah.

For our exhortation proceeded not from deceit, nor from impurity, nor in guile: but as we had been approved of God to be entrusted with the gospel, so we speak, not as pleasing men, but God Who searcheth our hearts.

For at no time have we used flattering speech – as ye know – nor a cloak of cupidity: God is witness.

Neither have we sought glory from men either from you or from others, when we might have been chargeable as legates of the Messiah. But we were lowly among you;

and like a nurse, who fondleth her children, so we also coddled (you), and were desirous to impart to you, not only the gospel of God, but also our own soul,

because ye were dear to us.

For ye recollect, brethren, that we labored and toiled, working with our own hands, by night and by day, that we might not be chargeable to anyone of you.


Ye are witnesses, and God (also), how we preached to you the Gospel of God, purely, and uprightly, and were blameless towards all them that believe:

as yourselves know, we entreated each one of you, as a father his children, and *conversed with* your hearts:

and we charged you, to walk as it becometh God, Who hath called you to His Kingdom and His glory.

Therefore, also we give thanks unceasingly to God, that the word of God which ye received from us (ye did not receive it as the word of men) but as being truly the word of God, which worketh efficiently in you, and in them that believe.

ABOUNA'S REFLECTIONS

It is beautiful, and edifying, to see the flurry of activity – and the generosity in the spiritual bouquet – in preparation for the bishop's visit on September 11th. This looks to be a truly blessed occasion filled with joy.

It happens that this year is the bishop's **40**th **Anniversary to the Priesthood**, so this will be an excellent opportunity to demonstrate our gratitude for his sacrifice and fidelity to our Church. He has asked that no gifts be given, but we can prepare a **Spiritual Bouquet** for him from the parish.

This is the final weekend, **September 4**th, to sign up for the Spiritual Bouquet. Near the St. Joseph statue at the front of the church, there are sheets for individuals and families to sign indicating which prayers, sacrifices, or other alms they wish to offer for Saidna's intentions. These prayers and alms will be presented to him in a card during his visit.

This weekend – September 4th – is also the final *second collection* that will be taken toward the next **heat-pump**. Of course, additional donations can be given to the building fund. These contributions will go toward the heat-pump and the masonry work that will be done. Please continue to be generous as we look to greater energy efficiency in the future.

It is now the opportunity for all to make known this visit far and wide, *especially to all those who benefited from St. Joseph's during the pandemic years*. Many, many people expressed their gratitude over these last years, that they had found St. Joseph's – and to have found her always open, filled with the Sacraments accessible and the Divine Mysteries constantly available. A place of refuge our parish became to many.

The bishop's visit is occasion for one and all to attend the ceremonies of that weekend *to express their thanks personally to him*. He encouraged all the parishes of the eparchy to remain open during those difficult years, and the many faithful who benefitted as a result *should now reciprocate that generosity by participating in the Spiritual Bouquet and gathering as one* at the **bruncheon reception** to be held in his honor on Sunday, **September 11**th.

The offerings to be made in a Spiritual Bouquet can be *simple prayers* – numbers of "Hail Marys" or "Our Fathers" – *rosaries* to be offered (individually or in family), *litanies* to be prayed, *chotkis* to be offered for the bishop's intentions, *Masses* that can be requested to be offered (the parish will be offering a **novena of Masses** for his intentions), days of *fasting*, works of *mercy*, or, in short, any of the classic works of Christianity: prayer, fasting, or alms.

Commit yourselves to these generous works for the eparch's intentions, and then make those intentions and good works known on **this last**

weekend, writing them up for the anniversary card. There are two sheets: one to record the prayers and works to be done for the Spiritual Bouquet, and a second one on which to sign your names.

Please note that we will **cancel the 11:00am Liturgy** on Sunday, September 11th, in order to make time for the Reception.

- 2.) Sunday Ramsho of the Holy Cross, 4:00pm
- 3.) Sunday Vigil, 4:30pm

Sunday, September 11th.

- 1.) Divine Liturgy, 9:00am
- **2.)** Brunch Reception in the bishop's honor following in the parish hall.

On this occasion, all Catholics who have received papal awards of merit in the Equestrian Orders of the Church, such as the Order of Saint Gregory, and all members of the Order of Saint Sharbel, should wear their insignia on Sunday morning for both the Divine Liturgy and the Reception.

It has now been over four years since our eparch last visited us. May each and every one of us make an effort to publicize this visit – specially to friends and to those benefitting these last years – and for us all to generously respond as one and enroll in the Spiritual Bouquet to be offered to His Excellency in honor of his many decades of priestly service to the honor of God and the salvation of souls.
