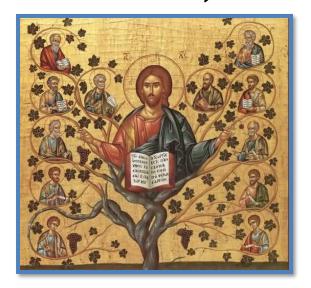

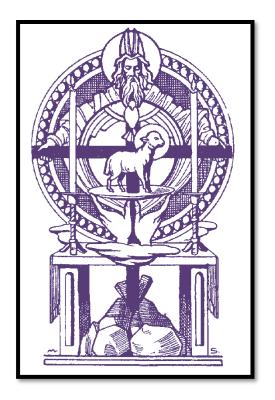

ABOUNA'S REFLECTIONS

What does it mean to be in a "genealogical line"? Why is it important to know our roots? The word "genealogy" simply means the *discourse*, *or treating of origin*. It comes from an awareness of origin and source within a family.

The Gospel today is central in importance. In it, relatively briefly, Saint Matthew records the human origins of the Messiah, His link with the husband of the Blessed Virgin, the extension of Israel into the Incarnation, and the adoption by Saint Joseph (son and heir of King David) of the Child born to Mary. In this text it is shown how the unique Son of God, born of a Virgin, can be part of the Davidic line of kingship necessary to fulfill the messianic prophecies of the Old Testament.

The Gospel listing of genealogy is not "boring"; it is subtle recitation of the glories, and defeats, of the people of Israel in their kings as these are raised up to be redeemed in the Messiah, Who has now arrived among men.

Today's commemoration is to call to mind that the Word Incarnate has a history on earth, a history that is elevated into the Eternal One through the Incarnation, and that there is a locatable historical origin of Christianity (unique among the religions of the world). These truths are extolled in Saint Joseph's act of adoption of the Eternal Word made flesh.

It is natural for someone to be proud of their family, treasure its memories, cherish its mementoes, and, as a result, to wish to know even more about her family's roots. Sadly, it is often too late in life when we realize these things, living distractedly as we do in the illusions of youth, and when it happens that we would like to ask more questions about family, those who could have answered them are already gone. This is why doing genealogy and ancestry research is the second most popular hobby in the United States (gardening is number one).

For these reasons, the notion of "tradition" has always been fundamental to human beings - no matter where they are in the world or from which culture they may come. To receive from our parents and ancestors means to cherish what we receive from them *because* they are our "roots". They define us and so help us to know ourselves better. Old men tell and retell stories not because they are babbling, but because human beings are innately geared to recount the last generations' stories to the next and younger generation. Necessarily born in ignorance, we are all born into a family and a history that is already a work in progress. We all have roots, whether we want them or not; it is a most simple and deep love to embrace them. We are pious by nature.

We must all learn the heritage that is ours by birth (as well as that which comes to us spiritually in the birth received by grace in faith) in order to know who and what we are. From the nursery rhymes

and fables told to us when we are infants and children, to the stories recounted about the last generation, we are creatures who grasp reality, define ourselves, and look to the future through stories. This is true all the more when it comes to the heritage of faith and grace. We are "born from above" into another history and another lineage that is already "a work in progress" set in motion on the morning of the Resurrection.

It is important for us to treasure our origins firstly because this is the **virtue of piety**. Recognition of our origins in both the natural and supernatural orders is imperative; we must possess this virtue as it shows honesty of existence – we all come from somewhere. By contrast, to know this is to know the true meaning of "impious".

Impious does not mean that one is evil, but it does mean that one does not possess the virtue of piety, and that one has a disregard of one's "story" and origin. The impious person is therefore almost certainly also self-centered and selfish. As a result, the impious lack a sense of honor or obligation toward those around them. A world filled with the impious is a world without unity of culture or shared purpose of goal (because it is filled with selfish individuals) and thus is a world that is either in anarchy, or on the verge of becoming so.

The modern rebellion against tradition, therefore, is completely unnatural, impious, and self-destructive. A people without roots are a *rootless* people, and a people without a heritage is blind. Understanding this, we can rightly say that our future is in our past. When the rejection of tradition affects religion the results are catastrophic, for the faith itself is then rejected as it is precisely the Catholic Faith that can only be "handed down" to us. Everyone has received that faith through someone who had already possessed it.

If we do not know or appreciate where we come from we are left unmoored in this life, and rudderless in the voyage of life. It also means that we must "invent" ourselves in this moment, define ourselves in only one life-time, and, as usually happens, collapse into ourselves solipsistically, which can only foster egoism and an exaggerated sense of self-importance. *The rejection of tradition makes all things ephemeral*. In the religious world it fosters a loss of faith and a misunderstanding of divine revelation.



One of our liturgical books is called the *Fenquitho*, a Syriac adaptation from the Greek meaning a "jewel box", indicating our Maronite faith is a tradition to treasure and preserve, and a heritage from

our ancestors and the martyrs that must be embraced. *Beit Maroun is a people of tradition, or it is nothing at all*. Without our Maronite tradition we are no longer a Church; we would not be distinguishable from the Syrian Church of Antioch. Influence and formed by both the Western and Eastern Syriac Churches, our history and tradition are unique among the Syriac Churches.

Without our Maronite tradition we are not a people as we would have no heritage or treasure to pass on to our children. To be heirs requires us to transmit that treasure and heritage to others; to be the children of Saint Maron means we must communicate the Catholic Faith to others. It is one thing to possess the Catholic Faith, but another to possess its redemptive power within the Church of **Beit Maroun**. This is the witness of the martyrs and ancestors that has been bequeathed to us at St. Joseph's parish.

We are not Catholics who just happen to have a history rooted in the Near East; this is not a story of mere ethnicity. We are children of our Father Saint Maron, heirs of the martyrs, and disciples of the great defenders of the orthodox, apostolic, and catholic faith – or we are nothing; good for nothing but to be trampled under the feet of man and beast⁴ and to disappear.

That we are here means that we have work to be done. We must be *pious* in our cherished origins and faithful children of that tradition. Those who have come to serve the Good One more recently in the Maronite Church are as welcome to this tradition and responsibility as are those who have been born to it.

So Genealogy Sunday is here to glory in the treasures that have been given to us by our ancestors. We glory because we know this to be the path of God; and we know this further because He has followed the very same ancestral path in His Incarnation and Nativity.

Our Lord is pious in the fullest sense of the word. He formed the people who were His origin, and loved those from whom He came. From all eternity He created in time, and He loved those whom He chose to create. He formed the People of Israel, bringing them from bondage and slavery into a relationship that He nurtured for two millennia. Then, in the fullness of time, He chose to come among those whom He had formed, and finding His origin among them in time, He cherished "His story", one that He had created as God, but one that He had inherited as Man.

Imitating the Incarnate Word, may we all treasure our tradition, cling to our story, honor those who have gone before us, especially in the matters that touch the apostolic faith which we have been blessed to receive by the merciful hand of God.

For those who have the light to see, and the hearts to cherish, everything in the end is *fenquitho*.

The Kativity Fast

December 15-23rd inclusively

As we were reminded by our Patriarch in his recent Lenten Letters, it is our tradition to fast in preparation for the great feasts, and all are encouraged to do so faithfully, *par*. 25:

This fast is known as "The Fast of the Nativity", during which the faithful abstain from eating meat, dairy products, and eggs, from December 16th and ends December 24th.

NB: *for the faithful in the USA, who celebrate Christmas Eve much as Christmas, the dates are* 15th-23rd *December inclusively.*

We are reminded in *paragraph* 21 of the same letter that "a fast" is **to go without all foods from midnight to noon**, after which we abstain from animal flesh and almost all animal products – this is most similar to a "vegan" diet as one would call it these days.

When a fast day falls on a Saturday or a

Sunday (as will be the case this year on **December 17-18**th) one can eat as they wish throughout the day, but should still abstain from all animal flesh and animal products, although, by tradition, shellfish may be eaten on these days, but no fish.

These observances are **for all who have** attained the age of the use of reason, *par.* 22.

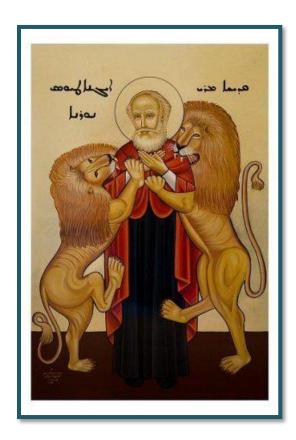
