


For the Kingdom of God is not food and drink; but is righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Spirit.

ABOUNA'S REFLECTIONS

Ruth, Badiha, and all the crew are to be heartily thanked for the beautiful brunch we had this past Sunday. It was a real treat to be able to gather with such enjoyment.

While labelled for "Super Bowl Sunday", we will from now on hold this brunch in honor of the Father of our Church, and in conjunction with the holyday – Saint Maron, on February 9th – on the second Sunday of February. It was a true joy to see many attend and enjoy the culinary skill and to share the happiness of so many. Adding an upbeat rendition of "happy birthday" and an excellent cake, along with a charming card, to celebrate with this "old man" his birthday was an unexpected delight for which I am grateful.

Thank you to all for making the day so memorable. If our *marfaa* on this Cana Sunday succeeds even half as much as last week's festivity, our joy and pleasure will be complete.



It has been asked what the Arabic word "marfaa" actually means, and why do we call today's celebration by such a name. Living in the West, we all know the meaning of **Mardi Gras**, "Fat Tuesday". As an observance, our day is related to this, of course, but it is not on Tuesday, nor is it for deep frying in "fat", but the intention, as a preparation for Lent, and as gastronomic celebration, is similar.

This word, "marfaa", is our English adaptation from the Arabic verb r-f-a, (غني), which means to elevate or heighten. When the prefix m (ع) is added to a word, in general, it indicates that it is being used as a participle or possibly as a noun. As when "mabrouk" is used meaning "blessing" or "congratulations". So, "marfaa" has then a meaning of the "lifting up" or the "raising".

There are a couple interpretations for this annual festivity's title. One is that Cana Sunday – the Entrance into the Great Fast – is the moment that we raise up our hearts, minds, and eyes to the Hidden One Who bestows upon us all blessings, so that we can prepare ourselves and enter generously into Lent. There has also been a tradition in which a goat or lamb is raised up and then slain for its meat to celebrate the last day before the Fast.

Another interpretation of "marfaa" is that the "raising up" refers to the "giving up" of meat and animal products that will begin on Ash Monday. In this case, marfaa is more related to the beginning of the Fast and less about a festive meal. The idea is also that the faithful "use up" the animal products they still have in their houses. This is similar to the carne levare (carnival) in the Latin tradition meaning "to remove/take away meat".

Either meaning is fitting, and probably both should be embraced. This would mean that *marfaa* is a moment for us to celebrate our life in prayer, lifting up our eyes, minds, and spirits to the Living One, by offering up our food stuffs and set them aside in order to clear our minds, illumine our prayer, strengthen our will, cleanse our bodies, make reparation for our sins, and generously enter into the Great Fast.

As it is the last moment, we festively eat these good things on this last day before we set them aside until we celebrate the Day of the Resurrection. Determination and resolve clear the path to true freedom for the children of the light.

May the Good One strengthen all hearts to generously embrace the Great Fast, raise our spirits on high in gracious thanksgiving, and lavish His joy upon us as we celebrate as one this day and all the days of our lives, together in our beautifully radiant Faith.





The Traditional and Patriarchal Norms for the Great Fast

- A.) Although all the days of Lent are traditionally fast days, special effort is to be put in to observe fully the first and last weeks of the holy season: the week of Ash Monday and Great and Holy Week.
- B.) Ash Monday and the First Week of Great Lent and Great Week of the Passion and especially Great and Holy Friday of the Crucifixion through to noon on Saturday of the Great Light are Days of Fast and Abstinence according to our traditions.
- C.) For all, as a minimum requirement according to the sacred canons, we must <u>fast</u> on Ash Monday and on Good Friday.

 <u>Abstinence</u> must be observed on all Fridays of Great Lent. The days of fast and those of abstinence are strictly to be free of all flesh meats.
- D.) From the <u>age of reason</u> onward, all are obliged to follow the abstinence from all meat, meat products, and dairy products on these fast days.
- E.) All Wednesdays and Fridays throughout the year are traditional days of fast and abstinence from all meat and dairy products.
- F.) In general, the sick, expectant mothers, those involved in heavy labor or exertion, and the elderly who need to eat regularly are exempted from fasting and abstinence, especially those who are under medical care for chronic illnesses.
- G.) <u>Saturdays</u> and <u>Sundays</u> in the eastern traditions are not days of fasting as are the weekdays.
 - 1.) Traditionally, abstinence is still observed from all meat and meat products, from all dairy products, eggs, and from fish.

- 2.) Traditional mitigation on Saturday and Sunday does allow for the consuming of shellfish and wine (or other alcohol).
- 3.) There is no fast restriction of time. One may eat at any hour.
- 4.) In its celebration, **fish** *may be eaten on* **Sha'neenee** (*Hosanna Sunday/Palm Sunday*)
- H.) Breaking the Fast is permitted also on the following feastdays:
 - 1.) Saint John Maron (March 2);
 - 2.) The Forty Martyrs (March 9);
 - 3.) Saint Patrick (March 17th);
 - 4.) Saint Joseph (March 19th); and,
 - 5.) The Annunciation (March 25th).

QUANTITY: In our tradition, the weekday fast means no food whatsoever between midnight and noon, only water and medication are permitted.

QUALITY: Also, in our traditional eastern tradition, the days of fast are in practice more or less vegan, that is, no meat, no seafood, no meat products, no dairy products, and no eggs are eaten.
