ABOUNA'S REFLECTIONS

Day is dawning upon us;
the power of darkness is fading away.
From the true Light
there arises for us
the Light Which illumines
our darkened eyes.*

Light – it allows us to see the world around us. In it we see and learn. It permits us to look upon those whom we love. From sight, and experience, we develop the fuller understanding of "light" in all its rich meaning: not only for physical sight, but also the illumination and clarification of the mind in knowledge and wisdom.

Epiphany means "manifestation" in Greek. In this feast we celebrate and honor the appearance of God among us. In the Baptism of Christ, this revelation of the Triune God is known as the *theophany*: "the manifestation of God". In it is revealed both the Trinitarian Personality of Divinity and it manifests the form and institution of Christian Baptism.

The Divine Word entered time, born of the ever-virgin Mary. Every intelligent being has been created to know and love God, so that we, as intelligent human beings, might arrive at this noble purpose He chose to enter among us and called out to us in the grace of faith and revelation. Faith illumines the spirit in light, giving the human mind vision, horizon, and direction during life, that is, life as it is meant to be – an intelligent human life raised up into God to fulfill the purpose for which it has been created. *Salvation is the realization of the fulness of this gift of life into eternity*.

In the Epiphany, then, we honor His Incarnation, His Birth in Bethlehem, His revelation to the Jewish shepherds, His star guiding the Gentile Magi, and in the Theophany of the Triune Personality of the One Who has loved us from all eternity at His Baptism by John the Forerunner. In this, we are made free.

Epiphany is the original "Christmas" that recognizes and celebrates Immanuel, "God-withus".

Being a festival of the "divine manifestation," it is also a celebration of the illumination of the human mind made possible by the coming of the Messiah. We live and act the way we think,⁵ and so it is

fitting to honor the divine Light that has come into the world. It heals our minds, elevates our hearts, unifies our lives, and allows us **by** *grace* to become what God is **by** *nature*. Love for love, we respond in the light of gracious gift.

Understanding all this, it is easy for us to see that Immanuel did not come to make us merely upright citizens and "decent" people – one need not be a Christian for this – but that He make us truly so much more: that we might be transformed into the children of God and heirs of the eternal Kingdom. This transformation is impossible without grace and the Gospel. For this reason, "orthodox" means both "correct belief" and "correct praise," that is, correct knowledge and worship. One, holy, catholic, and apostolic, the true faith must be "orthodox", too.

When we freely enter by faith and baptism into the divine Light of the Incarnate Son, baptized in the Jordan, we are made children of the Light; but for this to happen we must allow ourselves to be enlightened by the teaching, life, and grace of the Messiah. What is received in hidden grace is explicated and "manifested" in catechesis. The doctrine of Holy Church clarifies our minds to more fruitfully follow in the footsteps of Our Lord, Divine Wisdom Incarnate.

We receive grace, and in response we must choose to be formed and transformed by the Divine Liturgy, the Liturgical Seasons, and the Sacred Mysteries. This is the concrete path and the easiest way to holiness.

The divine light of doctrine and grace "illumine our darkened eyes", as we await the definitive epiphany in the Resurrection from the dead.

Faot of the Mineviteo

Within the Syriac tradition, both east and west, during the first days of the final week following the Epiphany, and coming just before the weeks commemorating the dead, we observe *The Supplication of the Ninevites*. This is a transitional fast on *Monday*, *Tuesday*, and *Wednesday* that moves us from the festivities surrounding the Glorious Nativity and *Denho* toward the Great Lenten Fast that approaches.

This year these days of fasting will be on Monday, *January 15*, Tuesday, *January 16*, and Wednesday, *January 17*th.

This fast was first instituted in the <u>seventh century</u> by **Mar Sabrisho**, bishop of Beit Garmai,⁹ who ordered the three days of prayer and fasting in response to an epidemic that had ravaged his eparchy. Later, these penitential days became universal practice throughout the Syriac Churches.

Fasting *elevates* the spirit and *cleanses* the mind, as well as *purifying* the body. It fosters a healthy spirit of **repentance** and calls down upon us the grace of God. It strengthens the mind to focus first to the things of God, and to relegate the concerns of this earth to their proper place – subordinated to the things of God. In the Gospel, our Lord speaks to Nicodemus about a new life of grace and of baptism, and He asks rhetorically whether the one who does not properly judge the things of earth can ever come to understand the things of heaven.

A clouded intellect is never disposed to know the things of God, and worldly ignorance and

brothers, *Adurpawa* and *Mihrnarsé*, with their sister *Mahdoukh*, were martyred there. In the **fifth century**, under King Yezdegerd II (438-57), the "History of the city of Beit-Slokh" makes mention of hundreds and thousands of martyrs slain in this city (Moesinger, *Monumenta Syriaca*, II). The "Synodicon Orientale" (Paris, 1902, 674) mentions nine metropolitans of Beit-Slokh who assisted at various councils between 410 and 612.
