

he will appoint him over all his property; but if that steward should say within his heart, 'My master is slow to return,' and starts to beat his master's servants and maidservants, and begins to eat and drink, and get drunk, that servant's master shall return on a day he is not expecting and at an hour he does not know. He shall *cut him off* and assign him a place with the unbelievers.

"The servant who knows his master's will, and who did not make preparations for him in keeping with his will, shall be beaten with many blows; but the one who does not know his will and who acts in a manner deserving blows, shall be beaten with few blows.

"For from everyone who has been given much, much shall be demanded; and from the one entrusted with much, more shall be required at that man's hand."

ABOUNA'S REFLECTIONS

Praise, glory, and honor to Him
Who sanctifies priests and perfects bishops;
He chose them as guardians of His Flock,
entrusted to them the treasures of His grace,
and delivered to them
the keys of His Kingdom
that they might distribute His riches
to those in need.

To the Good One is due glory and honor this evening, and all the days of our lives, now and forever.

Ours is a visible religion. The beauty of the Christian Priesthood is that it continues as the thread of history and the living vein of divine life throughout the Body of Christ, the Church. It is the "back bone" of the Mystical Body of Christ through which, and from which, life radiates out in the Divine Mysteries of Christ's Presence among the faithful and consecrated members of the Church.

From the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*:

1536 Holy Orders is the sacrament through which the mission entrusted by Christ to his apostles continues to be exercised in the Church until the end of time: thus, it is the sacrament of apostolic ministry. It includes three degrees: episcopate, presbyterate, and diaconate.

While families, peoples, and nations will come and go until the Last Day, the Holy Priesthood will be present and waiting at Our Lord's Parousia. Our own descendants and families may have disappeared by then, but there shall be priests awaiting the glory of the Lord on the Last Day.

Belonging to the essence of the Church, the Sacramental Priesthood is likewise *indefectible*.

The individual men consecrated in the Sacrament of Holy Orders are "sealed" with a spiritual disposition to the grace and labor to which they are called and which they must accomplish as the agents and *instruments of Christ, Head of His Body*.

The Rozoh of Holy Orders thus contains one of the three *permanent metaphysical transformations* acquired through the Divine Rozeh and Sacraments. These "characters" conferred in Baptism, Chrismation, and in Holy Orders variously conform the Christian to the Word Incarnate in a permanent manner.

By sin, one can lose the grace of God, but nothing can efface the sacred character in the soul.

From the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*:

1121 The three sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Orders confer, in addition to grace, a sacramental *character* or "seal" by which the Christian shares in Christ's priesthood and is made a member of the Church according to different states and functions.

This configuration to Christ and to the Church, brought about by the Spirit, is *indelible*; it remains forever in the Christian as a positive disposition for grace, a *promise* and *guarantee* of divine protection, and as a *vocation* to divine worship and to the *service* of the Church. Therefore, these sacraments can never be repeated.

In truth, there is only one Priest in Christianity and that is our Lord God and our Savior, Jesus Christ. The men whom we call "priests" are the frail conscious instruments of the Lord. Men who have been called by Him to be consecrated into the Divine Mystery of Holy Orders are ingrafted into His Incarnation, His unique Priesthood uniting God and man, and this is what makes them able to officiate and stand *in persona Christi*, as say the theologians, *in the person of Christ*.

In this Divine Mystery, men are made "priests" and they become His sacramental, living presence in each generation, an instrumental presence that extends the Mystery of the God-Man born once to the ever-virgin Mother of God and extends His work of salvation in time and space until the Last Day.

The Messiah is wedded to His Spouse, and, indeed, He is His Body composed of all the faithful and the elect called in faith and baptism. The Church is a living organism and Baptism is the foundational Sacrament that introduces each of the faithful into the Mystical Body. It introduces each of the baptized into the mystery of Salvation, consecrates the Inheritance of the Redeemer, and opens the Sacraments to each as they are made into a royal and priestly people. This is the Church as a whole. All the baptized are formed into a sacred nation.⁵

From out of this Royal and Priestly Nation, men are called to instruct, amplify, nourish, teach, consecrate, and guide this People of God. This vocation is consecrated in the Sacrament of Holy Orders. Instituted by our Lord at the Last Supper, the sacred priesthood originates from within the mystery of the Church, and from that place nourishes and extends the Church within, and into, each generation, gathering the nations of mankind into the work of redemption. The priesthood gathers and shepherds all the children of God into the unity of the Body of Christ.6

The divine and *sacramental Priesthood is of the essence of the Church*. It flows from out of Christ in His consecrated People, and extends the Mystery of Salvation within that People, while gathering the

scattered elect into the one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church of Christ.

Like the bread and wine in the Divine Eucharist, the men called by Christ to Himself (this is "vocation"⁷) are transformed into an instrumental reality of Incarnate Wisdom, the God-Man in His work of salvation. The Sacraments are the *Sacred Rozeh* by which we live, without which salvation and is impossible, and it is the priesthood that confects those Sacraments. Therefore, without the Christian priesthood, salvation in practice becomes impossible.

In historic time, in a visible manner, the Son of God came as Man among us so that we might receive from Him all the help, grace, and holiness needed to become His disciples here below, conformed to Him, and in this conformity to find our salvation. We are transformed by grace through the Mysteries, into that which He is by Nature.

All this means that Christianity is an incarnate religion, visible to all who have eyes to see, even as God Himself became visible in *the* Incarnation and was born into this world at Bethlehem.



"Spirituality" in the modern ephemeral, impermanent sense is a nebulous feeling that is completely foreign to Christianity by its very formlessness and vagueness. The Catholic Faith is a calling, and it brings salvation. **The Gospel is a clarion call, and its teachings are clear.**

Sentiments there are, of course, but feelings are not its foundation, nor are they central to the Apostolic Faith. There is neither "left" nor "right", nor "conservative" nor "liberal" in the apostolic faith. It is certainly not to be identified with either feelings or politics. *The stabilizing rudder in the course of salvation is the apostolic priesthood.*

In the Church and her Mysteries, we are given to see, hear, touch, and enter into the Divine Mystery of redemption and grace. God became Man so that we might find Him, know Him, love Him in return, and be able to participate – as human beings fully composed of body, mind, and spirit – in His divine reality through the *visible Holy Rozeh*. For this reason, the contemporary phrase about being "spiritual, but not religious" has little meaning, and finds no compatibility with the orthodox, apostolic, and catholic Christian Religion.

We worship the Merciful One Who chose to walk among us. This is the one eternal Mystery made known to us even as we stumble; but ultimately we fail in our existence when we choose another path and fail to follow seriously the Gospel of life.⁸

Thus, it is that those men, weak though they may be and wounded by human foibles, are nevertheless to be honored, obeyed, and prayed for as they freely have taken upon themselves the sacred burden to renounce their own personal lives that they might be consecrated into the Incarnate Savior and serve His Flock.

In each generation priests are made His mouthpieces and His hands to convey the incarnational channels of grace given to the world, the Holy Sacraments – the only path to Eternal Life.

The Catholic Priesthood is the oldest brotherhood in history, originating in the Upper Room at the Last Supper. It is an unbroken line of succession directly from Our Lord and returning to Our Lord on the Day of Judgment.

The priesthood is central to the essence of our Catholic Church. In life, priests bring the Holy One to us and join us to the Hidden One in redemptive mercy.

These are the men of mercy that we commemorate and pray for all this week.

In his own death, may each priest be joined to the Eternal High Priest Whom he has faithfully served, the Fountain of all Holiness.

May the Lord bring each of His consecrated servants into the fullness the Kingdom in imperishable glory – crowned and surrounded by all the souls he has brought along with him into the Beatific Vision.


