

THIS DAY'S GOSPEL St. Luke 1; 5-25

In the days of Herod, king of Judea, there was a priest named Zechariah, of the division of Abijah; and he had a wife of the daughters of Aaron, and her name was Elizabeth.

And they were both righteous before God, walking blamelessly in all the commandments and ordinances of the Lord.

But they had no child, because Elizabeth was barren, and both were advanced in years. Now while he was serving as priest before God when his division was on duty, according to the custom of the priesthood, it fell to him by lot to enter the Temple of the Lord and burn incense.

And the whole multitude of the people was praying outside at the hour of incense.

And there appeared to him an angel of the Lord standing on the right side of the altar of incense. And Zechariah was troubled when he saw him, and fear fell upon him.

But the angel said to him, "Do not be afraid, Zechariah, for your prayer has been heard, and your wife Elizabeth will bear you a son, and you shall call his name John.

And you will have joy and gladness, and many will rejoice at his birth; for he will be great before the Lord, and he shall drink no wine nor strong drink, and he will be filled with the Holy Spirit,
even from his mother's womb.

And he will turn many of the sons of Israel
to the Lord their God,
and he will go before Him
in the spirit and power of Elijah,
to turn the hearts of the fathers to the children,
and the disobedient to the wisdom of the just,
to make ready for the Lord a people prepared."

And Zechariah said to the angel, "How shall I
know this? For I am an old man, and my wife is
advanced in years."

And the angel answered him, "I am Gabriel, who stand in the Presence of God, and I was sent to speak to you, and to bring you these good tidings. And behold, you shall be silent and unable to speak until the day that these things come to pass, because you did not believe my words, which shall be fulfilled in their time." And the people were waiting for Zechariah, and they wondered at his delay in the Temple. And when he came out, he could not speak to them, and they perceived that he had seen a vision in the Temple, and he made signs to them and remained mute.

And when his time of service was ended, he went to his home.

After these days his wife Elizabeth conceived, and for five months she hid herself, saying, "Thus the Lord had done to me in the days when He looked upon me, to take away my reproach among men."



ABOUNA'S REFLECTIONS

Inevitable death: the departure from time Part V

The liturgical season of Announcements (*Souboreh*) is about *unveiling*. Uncovering the mystery of God's revelation to Israel and to the world; the manifestation of grace and divine

charity in time; and the manifestation of light, purpose and truth in the Glorious Incarnation of the Word, all show to us the course of life as we are meant to be as the children of the Light.

Revelation of grace and redemption is the stable point around which the world rotates in flux. The saying, "time flies," is well known, and especially true as we age. The history of the world is in constant movement toward the consummation of all things as designed by the Creator.

While it true that all the world is moving toward the final point at the end of time, for each of us there is an individual version of that history, one that we play out alone. Every moment of our lives moves us inexorably and inevitably to the instant of our exit from this world of time: our death. Or, in the exceptional case of being alive at time of the *Parousia* of our Lord, it may coincide with the Day of Judgment itself.

"Time," in its most general sense, is the measurement of change, a gage of "before" and "after". Other than the divine and transcendent Source of all existence, all things that exist change. There are three measurements of existence and life: time, aevum and eternity. The first is the lot of all creatures in the cosmos; the second refers to the realm of spirits and the immaterial existence of the watchers (angels); and, lastly, the third term is applicable only to the fully divine, it is appropriate only to the Compassionate Hidden One, God.

Here below, we necessarily live in *time*. When we die, we leave the temporal world and enter into a form of existence that the teachers call *aevum*. The measurement that we call *eternity* is truly applicable only to God. This last term refers to *the immutable perfection of unending life simultaneously and perfectly possessed in its fullness*.

Hunh??

Don't worry; this is not a concept fully understandable to our minds here below. Eternity is, in effect, transcendent to all measurement of change and it is the ageless *present* - the "*permanent 'now*" as the theologians call it. Saint Augustine remarked that the life of grace moves the individual into the stability of godlike "non-changingness," if there were such a word; unchanging, because all perfection and life are fully possessed. Nothing can be lost and nothing needs to be acquired by God.

This all means that the more that we collaborate with the grace of God the more perfectly stable our existence becomes, and the more perfectly we become the children of God the more perfect we become even as human beings. We enter into the very Life of God.

We are told that the Incarnation of Christ is both a revelation of the Unseen One and a revelation of man to himself.¹ This means that our God and Savior as the Son of the everblessed Virgin Mary is the very image and likeness of human nature renewed and glorified – what we were made to be.

During the season of Announcements we move liturgically, gradually – from the revelation to Zachariah and the birth of John the Baptist through to the Genealogy of the Messiah – closer and closer to the Revelation of the Hidden One in the Incarnation and in the Glorious Nativity of the Divine Word. In all this, we are simultaneously commemorating an historic event *and* celebrating the full revelation of what we are meant to be as men: fully human and the children of God by grace. This liturgical season, then, sets our sight to the past, the present (transforming grace) and toward the future goal.

Death is the moment when we leave all the vicissitudes and constant oscillations of this very unstable earthly domain, and we enter into a level of existence in which our true being will come into force. In a sense, death becomes

the point when we are put in the balance and weighed to see whether we have learned what the revelation of grace and God's compassion has truly meant for the world, and whether we have availed ourselves *personally in time* of God's extended Hand of mercy. Have we lived fully conformed to the Gospel of Christ?

At the moment of death, then, we will become fully that which we have been obscurely on earth – in a hidden manner. As we die, the truth of our individual being will be made manifest to us. This is what we call the *particular judgment*.

Let us live the truth of the Gospel not as mere spectators but as full participants in the Mystery of grace,² in which God Himself desires to sustain us in His charity and lift us up by His compassion.
