Toòay's Gospel¹ St. Luke 19: 1-10

As Jesus entered and passed through Jericho, a man named *Zachai*, who was wealthy and a tax collector, wanted to see who Jesus was, but he could not on account of the crowd, as he was short.

ABOUNA'S REFLECTIONS

Close on thirty years ago, when I was first ordained, I was asked to act on a "private adoption" as the intermediary between the adopting family and the young woman who was giving up her child to a good home. In the state where I worked this type of adoption was legal and the process was flawless; it gave the parents concerned the choice to give up their child (for necessary reasons) to a Catholic family where the child would find a solid home. This was "closed" to the adopting parents, meaning that they did not know the birth-parents of the child, but the biological parents did know to whom the child was to be reared. It all worked beautifully, and was simple as relayed through the lawyer. It did not require the constant home visits and expensive redtape that now so often afflicts good people who are just looking to open their homes to children in need. That child is grown now and has received an excellent Catholic upbringing, to which Faith he remains firmly attached. It was a "win-win" situation where the biological mother also went on, greatly matured by the experience, to later establish her own family where love and the Catholic Faith were cherished.

This week, I note this episode as I think it a good example of how a healthy social network can succeed. Compounding bureaucracy and the red-

tape of state regulations does not necessarily help the children of a state – indeed, often the opposite is true as children get "lost" in the "system". Surely, we can do better than this. It is surprising how much people believe that "the system" can "save" them from all difficulties. In final analysis, we are "the system" and government, especially in modern democracies, is reflective of the population. Government is not a "them", it is "us". The dysfunction of Washington is a clear indicator of the unhealthiness of the nation.

In the Church's thinking there is a principle of *subsidiarity*, which means that each level of society should be able to supply all its own needs – and be left to its own – insofar as each is able. This means that we are to have a communal vision in which mutual help is present to aid weaker members to stand on their own feet; subsidiarity is not about "handouts", but assistance to strengthen all in responsibility. This may be effected by apprenticeships, for example. Centralizing control and government bureaucracy for all social questions is totally foreign to the Catholic mind as laid out by the catechism and the teachings of the popes, especially as laid out over the last two centuries.

Some people may find this ironic, but this is precisely why so many Catholic immigrants of the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries were affiliated with the Democratic Party; I say "ironic" as it is almost impossible to see today - without reference to history -- that the Democratic Party was once the political party of small and decentralized control of government. For this reason, historically, the Democratic Party was for generations the party of "the South". How far we have come! These days the party of the "Republic" (with Abraham Lincoln as a founding member) which sought centralized government to the point of a war against secession in the 1860s, is now the "anti-big-government" party, while the decentralizing party of the past century now seems to look to Washington to solve all social ills. We live in a kooky world.

As Catholics, we should know that the Church has a Christian vision for the world and that *there are principles* by which we are to envision the Gospel as it is to be lived in the world. It is a doctrine, and there are principles of thought, which are grounded in the writings of the ancient Fathers of the Church

and matured through centuries of reflection and teaching. It is a much more august body of thought than the slogans spewed out nightly by CNN and FOX.

Communal networks and social support require obtainable shelter (housing). For those children left isolated without parents, a proper system that allows for compassionate care, whether through orphanages or through secure adoption, should be in place. Closing down most all the orphanages and the mental hospitals in the mid-twentieth century does not seem to have resolved any issues, on the contrary, that action seems to have simply cast these unfortunates to the four winds. Children now bounce from foster-home to foster-home and those with psychological illnesses were turned out into the streets. What percentage of the homeless would be better served in what had once been called "asylums"? While those homes and hospitals may have needed reform, we threw out the baby with the bathwater as we cast onto the streets these weaker members of society.

Killing children before birth is not a solution, obviously, and forcing emergency workers and even librarians to act as social workers and care-givers to the mentally ill (now housing in prisons those who should so often be patients) seems socially irresponsible at best and barbaric as a public policy.

As Catholics we should be concerned, and work where possible, to see that housing and medical aid is obtainable by as many as possible within our communities. Lack of housing can often be one of the reasons why families are unable to care for the children that God sends them; in charity, we should have concern to alleviate this stress and where possible have care for the children when they become homeless through ineptitude, perhaps, on the part of the birth-parents. Some of the finest members of this parish once came into our world as adopted members.

Nevertheless, we do all this insofar as we are able, knowing that it will never be possible to heal all poverty; and yet, we should know at the end of our lives that we had done all we could to ameliorate the world that was ours during the brief years that the Good Lord gave to us to follow in His footsteps on the royal way of the Gospel.


