

This Oxy's Edistle Romans 14: 14-23

For I am certain in the Lord Jesus that nothing which comes from Him is impure, but if something seems unclean to someone, then it is so to him.

If you cause your brother distress on account of food, then you no longer walk in charity. Do not destroy a man for whom the Messiah has died because of some meat.

Do not allow anyone to speak ill of what good things we have, for the Kingdom of God does not consist in food and drink, but in justice, peace, and joy in the Spirit of Holiness. Whoever serves the Messiah in these matters is pleasing to God and wins the approval of men. Let us then strive to be at peace and edify one another.

Let us not destroy the work of God for the sake of some meat, for although everything is

indeed clean, it would be wrong for one to eat it if it were to make another fall.

It is good not to eat meat or drink wine, and thereby avoid doing anything that might cause your brother to stumble.

If you have faith, keep it between God and yourself.

Blessed are those who do not condemn themselves in making subtle distinction; if someone is uncertain about a matter, and eats, then he condemns himself, because this is not done in faith.

For whatever does not proceed from faith is sin.

ABOUNA'S REFLECTIONS

We enter the Great Fast of Lent. There are many pressing concerns on everyone's mind, but we take refuge in the Sacred Heart, where radiant and eternal Peace is to be found. As Saint Augustine taught, we turn within to hear the voice of God through His grace. It is not to listen to our idle thoughts that we turn inward – who cares about one's own opinions or, even less, "'my' truth" – but to be attentive to the still, small voice that speaks in the light of grace of theological faith. This is "repentance"; we turn to the God of consolation in Whom we find health, well-being, and peace.

Ash Monday this year will have only a single Liturgy, at 6:00pm. Although it is originally a Latin ceremony, it beautifully symbolizes the fragility of life (from that perspective, the pandemic has been a wonderful meditation of "ashes") and that time is short. The wise man uses his gifts well, and he uses them *now*. Continually putting off things to the constant "tomorrow" is as deadly as it is foolish. Look up the legend of Saint Expeditus.

Minds illuminated, and inner ears attentive, we have hope to move forward in the healing and integration that is the Gospel. This is the meaning of Lent.³ We set aside these weeks to seriously listen to our Lord and follow His promptings.

We remember that "fast" has the meaning of "strengthening" (as in "stead fast") and it is for this purpose that we set ourselves to prayer, the works of compassion, and to our dietary restrictions and conscious temperance which we call simply, "fasting".

The opening of the Great Lent is also time for us to think of the annual <u>Bishop's Appeal</u>, which is assessed to our parish at <u>\$4,000.00</u>. This must be paid as is, there is no haggling as some might wish, but it goes to the excellent purposes of building up the fundamental strength and stability of our Maronite church, our Eparchy. Attached, you will find the annual letter from the bishop to this end.

We also have now to begin to gather together our strength in order to replace our oldest furnace in the church. This is an enormous project, and costly. The estimated expense will be around \$50,000.00, which is a bit overwhelming at first sight. Our tiny community may be small, but it is valiant in the faith of our fathers, and it is this type of regular maintence and upkeep that shows well our devotion to this faith of Antioch. Without regular maintence and upkeep, we will never be able to hand the faith and her liturgical observances to our children and our children's children.

There are actually many more projects that need immediate attention in structural masonry work and window maintenance (resealing them) along with this furnace replacement – about \$150,000.00

total. It is necessary for us to do this in stages, biting off the projects we can as monies come in. For now, the replacement of the furnace is our first priority.

Now, the positive element in all this, beyond its use as an excellent Lenten observance as alms, is that there has been a \$20,000.00 Challenge Grant proposed to the parish from an anonymous donor. This is an excellent and charitable aid to motivate the rest of us to contribute to these necessary costs. We will be setting up a "thermometer" at the entrances of the church to track our goal. Once we have the initial \$20,000.00 in place the grant will come into play, leaving us only ten thousand more to top off.

To cover the Lenten Eparchial Appeal, there will be two <u>special second collections</u> done on the <u>fourth Sunday</u> of these next two months: <u>February, 28th</u>, and on <u>March, 28th</u>. We must pay this assessment by April 1st. A clearly marked envelope placed in the collections at any time can also be added.

Please note that anything contributed that might take us over and above what is due will be set aside toward the necessary furnace replacement.

May the luminous and fortifying silence of the Great Fast deepen our attachment to the faith, enflame our charity and devotion, and move us to the supernatural and transcendent hope that maintains our trust, and builds generously for the future.

Please, take notice of our present protocols:

- All Catholics, of whatever Ritual Church, are more than welcome at Saint Joseph. We are all one Body of Christ.
- During this pandemic, there is no 2.) obligation to assist at the Divine Sacrifice.
- Those who are sick, or carry symptoms of sickness, must remain at home.
- All are recommended to give contact 4.) information (a list is provided at the door) in order to inform you if need arise from a case of the virus.
- 5.) All vulnerable, elderly, and at-risk individuals should remain at home and follow the Liturgies as posted on the parish's website.
- The Vigil Masses are suspended until 6.) further notice.
- All who are retired, or who may have a freer weekday schedule, are asked to consider assisting at Mass during the weekdays, Tues-Fri, 9:00am; and on Saturday at 10:00am.
- Everyone is asked to wear a face-mask. 8.)
- 9.) Hand sanitizers are available at the entrances and at the confessional.
- 10.) Seating at church must be "first-comefirst-served" and will be closed at "50".
- 11.) Everyone must sit in such a way that there is *no one immediately in front* of them and *no* one immediately behind them. The pews have been blocked off for this purpose.
- 12.) To control crowd flow and bring greater security, doors will be locked at the beginning of each Liturgy.
- 13.) A *six-foot distancing* is to be observed by those who approach the Divine Altar and wish to receive the Divine Eucharist in Holy Communion.
- 14.) And, lastly, at the end of Mass, those who wish to remain and pray in the church are welcome to do so, but all others are asked not to linger and visit within the church. Please exit through the Appleton Street doorway. If one wishes to visit, please do so outside the church, being mindful of the proper physical distancing.



The Traditional and Patriarchal Norms for the Great Fast

- A.) Ash Monday and the First Week of Great Lent and Great Week of the Passion and especially Great and Holy Friday of the Crucifixion through to noon on Saturday of the Great Light are Days of Fast and Abstinence according to our patriarchal tradition. cf. par. 22
- B.) For all, as a minimum requirement according to law, we must fast on Ash Monday and on Good Friday. Abstinence is to be observed on all Fridays of Lent. These days of fast are strictly to be meatless.
- C.) From the age of reason onward, all are obliged to follow the abstinence from all meat, meat products, and dairy products on these fast days even if they are strictly not obliged to fast.
- D.) All Fridays throughout the year are traditional days of fast and abstinence from all meat and dairy products.
- E.) In general, the sick, expectant mothers, and the elderly who need to eat regularly should be exempted from fasting and abstinence, especially those who are taking medications associated with chronic illnesses.
- F.) Saturdays and Sunday, although abstaining in the quality of foods, are not, in the eastern tradition, days of fasting.
- G.) Breaking the Fast is permitted also on the following feastdays:
 - 1.) Saint John Maron (March 2);
 - 2.) The Forty Martyrs (March 9);
 - 3.) Saint Patrick (USA) (March 17th);
 - 4.) Saint Joseph (March 19th); and,
 - 5.) The Annunciation (March 25th).

QUANTITY: In our tradition, the fast means no food whatsoever between midnight and noon, only water and medication are permitted.

QUALITY: Also, in our eastern tradition, the days of fast are in practice more or less vegan, that is, no meat, no seafood, no meat products, no dairy products and no eggs are to be eaten.
