THIS DAY'S GOSPEL St. Mark 2: 1-12

And when He returned to Capernaum after some days, it was reported that He was at home. And many were gathered together, so that there was no longer room for them, not even about the door.

And He was preaching the word to them. And some came, bringing to Him a paralytic carried by four men.

And when they could not get near Him because of the crowd, they removed the roof above Him. And when they had made an opening, they let down the pallet on which the paralytic lay. And when Jesus saw their faith, He said to the paralytic, "Son, your sins are forgiven."

Now some of the scribes were sitting there, questioning in their hearts, "Why does this man speak like this? It is a blasphemy! Who can forgive sins but God alone?"

And immediately Jesus, perceiving in His Spirit that they had questioned like this within themselves said to them, "Why do you question like this in your hearts? Which is easier, to say to the paralytic, 'Your sins are forgiven,' or to say, 'Rise, take up your pallet and walk?' But that you may know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins" – He said to the paralytic – "I say to you, rise, take up your pallet and go home."

And he arose, and immediately took up the pallet and went out before them all.

They were all amazed and glorified God, saying, "We have never seen anything like this!"

Only when we come to experience the beauty of God and our status as His children are we able to notice, truly perceive, see and seek remedy for the distance we fall short of this glorious state. As only the artist who perceives true beauty can understand the distortion of ugliness, so too only the virtuous can know the depravity of sin and vice.

Clarity of mind is essential in this pursuit of knowledge.

Many of us, and perhaps most, in the modern world live submerged in the vapors of sensuality. This does not mean that everything is sin, but is meant to point out the fact that we spend far too much of our time and means throughout life to satisfy *primarily* our sensual satisfaction and stimulation. Sense pleasure and sensuality dominate our culture. This is certainly a fundamental ingredient in our cultural disintegration that has resulted in the opioid addiction that now threatens to drown us nationally. It also is no surprise that pornography makes up the largest "business" on the internet.

We say "submerged in vapors" because the sense life that is supposed to be subordinate to free human will and human intelligence, persuades and dominates our whole lives in an inordinate manner. This tyranny easily can take the form of food, sex and "stuff". Plunged into the life of the senses, it is almost impossible for us to see and judge clearly. As the Fathers of the Church taught, and spiritual writers over the centuries have commented on, sensuality causes profound mental blindness. It dulls the intellect, disorients the will and smothers our reason. The ardor of sense experience and pleasure clouds our vision, even at the merely natural level. It completely blinds us to the things of God. The outward cravings and compulsion of the addict are an excellent expression of what we all suffer to some degree in sin.

This is not the way things were meant to be.

The remedy for this mental confusion is to re-orient our minds and seek clarity of vision. This means that we must place the senses and the sense experience back in their place: *subordinate* – "ordered under" – to the intellect and free-will that properly define us a human beings.

The word "fast" does not mean "deprivation", but "strength", and as we considered prayer briefly last week – the elevation of mind and will up to the eternal Throne of Divine Fire – so now we can consider the only path by which prayer is perfected: **fasting**, the second classical "work" or Christianity.

Fasting in its most basic form means to govern *all* our senses. It encompasses the custody of the *eyes*, the moderation of *touch*, the restraint of *sensual comfort*, nobility of *speech* and word, temperance in *smell* and the pursuit of thoughtful *silence*. It governs the moderation and proper use of *food*, and here is where most people identify "fasting", but this is only part.

Clearly, if we can come to moderate and rationally control our palate, we shall be able to govern the other senses. The reason for this is that our need for food is fundamental and essential to human existence. Hunger, sensuality and the sexual appetite are all inter-related. With one of these out of control, the others will necessarily also be out of whack. So it is that if we are unable to moderate our intake of food, then it will be nigh impossible to moderate our other senses. The image of the slovenly obese man, munching on chips and glued to the TV for hours on end, or in front of his computer screen - often/usually watching porn is not a cartoonish fantasy; it describes an unacceptably large portion of an undisciplined and sensual American population.

Fasting is any form of discipline that we establish to create a more *properly human life*, one where we control our senses and not the other way around. As with any discipline, it requires proper training. One cannot take a person, disabled for years in a wheelchair, and him them straight into the Boston Marathon. Cruel. The sad part is that we often do not train our children any longer in the ways of discipline, patience and delayed gratification. As a result, we all too often cripple our children's potential and submit them to the tyranny of the senses. Those weakened children become adults in turn and have even less to teach their own children. It makes for a tragic picture.

Because it is the only way that we can free the mind and heart from the inordinate howling demands of the senses, fasting is required for us to be able to pray correctly. This is why, from the beginning of the Church, especially in our Syriac heritage (and in all the East in fact) our tradition has been to fast from food both in quantity and in quality *every Wednesday* and *Friday* throughout the year, except


for Bright Week and Christmas Week. Lent is merely the period of time when we extend this seriousness of life to the whole week.

No one will say that fasting is easy, but when it is properly practiced it becomes a habit and second nature. Even as the smoker who has developed himself by habit and practice of smoking "can't quit" cigarettes, and as the obese person who has cultivated himself by the habit and escapism of perpetually eating food "can't resist" chips, fastfood and "munchies", so it is that the chaste soul practicing fasting, moderation and purity, also does so by habit and practice. As the fat woman feels compelled to eat and eat, so the ascetic person is inclined to turn her mind upward to the Throne of Divine Fire, and outwardly to honorable and noble things.

Which do we wish to be?

While we are still free, let us make choices so as to heal and progress, and not just drift along, languish and complain. May the Divine Physician fill us with celestial knowledge and with the will to reestablish, strengthen and improve our lives by His grace.

This is the only path to the Harbor of Salvation.

THE TWELVE WHO ARE SUICIDAL

Only twelve people came for the Way of the Cross on Friday instead of the usual 600. These twelve brave faithful defied rockets, and possible danger of death, in order to be able to follow the Fourteen Stations to Calvary, stopping especially at the 5th and 8th Stations.

- 1.) At the 5th Station, this little group of faithful questioned why Simon of Cyrene seemed to be absent so often in their lives, rather than being with them through those who could offer a helping hand on the kind word to soothe their pain and wounded lives... Instead they see the military forces all around, from differing groups, confronting each other and trying to prove their might keeping violence and hatred at its highest level. They do this in the pretense of saving the Country.
- 2.) At the 8th Station, Jesus consoles the women of Jerusalem, only here it is the Syrian families who are with Him, mourning loved one, homeless, the wounded, refugees and the numberless young people who are now orphaned or forgotten. The Lord Who is present to them here with His consolation wipes away their tears and strengthens their faith in the face of their sufferings; He allows them to see through these sufferings into the face of the Wounded Christ, and through this, the Glorious Light of the Resurrection to come.

Our gratitude for these twelve apostles who through the way of suffering and darkness show that all can be transformed into a Way of Hope.
