Tbis Óay's Epistle¹ I Thess 2: 1-13

You yourselves know, my brethren, that our arrival among you was not in vain.

Having previously suffered and been insulted as you know in Philippi and then in a great state of the state

- as you know - in Philippi, and then in a great struggle we proclaimed to you the Gospel of the Messiah in the confidence of our God. For our message was not from error, from impure motive, or in deceit, but just as we were approved by God that we be entrusted with His Gospel, speaking not according to what pleases men, but God, Who searches our hearts.

For we never used flattering speech, as you yourselves know, nor an occasion for greedy desire; God provides witness.

Nor have we sought human glory, either from you or from anyone else, although we could have been regarded as important men as Apostles of the Messiah, but rather we were humble among you.

And like a nurse who cares for her children, so we also love you and desire to give to you not only God's Gospel, but also our very selves because we have loved you.

So do remember, brethren, how we toiled and labored in the work of our hands, day and night, so that we would not be a burden to any of you.

You and God are witnesses of how we proclaimed the Gospel of God to you, purely and justly, and we were without fault in our relationship with all the faithful.

Indeed, you yourselves know how we, as a father to his children, exhorted each one of you and comforted your hearts.

And we testify to you, that you should walk in a manner worthy of God, Who has called you to His Kingdom and His glory.

On account of this we also give thanks constantly to God, because you have received the word of God from us.

You did not receive it as the word of men, but as it truly is: the word of God, which works effectively within you and in all who believe.

ABOUNA'S REFLECTIONS

Purpose and goal stamp morality upon a human action, its goodness or evil, that is, upon every conscious action. This means that everything we do in any conscious manner has a morality to it. Only the things that we do unconsciously are "neutral".

What, then, is our purpose? Is it good, or is it selfish? How do we maneuver the hurdles of life to attain those good purposes?

Before all else, we must freely embrace the Lifegiving Cross.

Obstacles will always be thrown before the tidings and healing work of the Divine Economy. From before the dawn of creation Satan – "adversary" – has sought to upset the Divine Plan and obscure the work of Divine Charity. It is the nature of the Gospel that hurdles arise and obstacles abound, because men are far too often focused only on themselves. And life comes only through death.

Read the parable of the weeds sown in the field of this world, **St. Matthew 13: 18-30**, and you will understand our present straights. An enemy has done this.

Woe to those who are agents impeding the path of salvation and the healing work of grace. They are, as has been said, dogs at a manger.³

When the Cross is made present in our lives we are called to embrace it, not fight against it, not whine, and certainly not selfishly manipulate it. We are to climb Calvary with the Sacred Heart. This is our task as "learners" – that is, "disciples".

When the Living One manifests Himself on Calvary, we enter with Him so that we might arrive, also with Him, at the glory of His Resurrection in the New Creation. It should be remembered that in the eastern tradition redemption is understood in a less "juridical" way than it is in the West.

The West emphasizes the Death as being "for" us, after which we must try to "join ourselves" to this

Death, but the action is done "for us". This is true as far as it goes, but the Eastern understanding is much more *personalized* in obligation. We must not only join ourselves to the historical Death on Calvary, we must *replicate that Death* in our individual lives. Our Lord insisted that we take up our cross *daily* and follow Him.⁴ This is why the true disciples of Christ cannot – indeed, would not wish to – escape the Mystery of the Cross as it is played out in each generation and in each one individually. This is our imitation of the Sacred Heart. It personalizes the imprint of grace in our lives.

Today, with this temporary "overflow Mass", we all place foot and step upward onto Calvary's paths. He who perseveres to the end shall be saved.⁵ All we ask for is the strength to persevere on the blood-stained, but life-giving path upward to the Weaver-of-Crowns. God bless you for embracing this present cross. We trust that your embrace of the Cross will build us up into a more sacred and persistently more faithful parish.

As we climb, we must cast off all selfishness, and quiet all whining, pacify all manipulativeness, and extinguish any petty meanness which egocentrism spawns. These things we must leave to the worldly, to those who do not lift their eyes beyond their own limited horizons of purely human concerns.

The crosses we presently meet are intended to be beneficial (in God's economy, not satan's) as they strip us of our illusions and orient our spirit to the divine light. *Stripped* and *scoured* clean, we can then be moulded by the hand of God into lamps of His life-giving brilliance. Only when we have been personally illumined can we ever hope to become lamps unto others, lights, as wrote Saint Paul, in a perverse and dark generation.⁶

Now we divide *the Sunday Qourbonoh into two*, until such time as health regulations ameliorate.

We embrace this as a Cross *and* as an investment in the future of this apostolic work. This obstacle may have originated in the dark recesses of human pettiness, in unenlightened selfishness, but by the hand of God it now becomes permeated with lifegiving grace. We see that, do we not?

This is an excellent sign that the angel of darkness fears your present fidelity, and trembles at the prospect of a future resplendent with supernatural goodness that you will accomplish as a parish.

Thanks be to God that you seek the salvific light of the Divine Mysteries and remain faithful to Them even in this present difficulty. Petty hysteria bears its own punishment, and we wish nothing but grace and light to those in whom it festers.

Take up this Cross and continue to walk the paths of Antioch;

seek the consolations and strength of grace; long for the ever-increasing spread of the light of the Gospel;

pray for the fire of charity to burn brightly within our hearts;

and anchor yourselves in hope before the winds of reproach and obstacles.8

Everything passes, God alone endures.

The Life-giving Cross

Please, take notice of our present practices:

- 1.) All Catholics, of whatever Ritual Church, are more than welcome at Saint Joseph. We are all one Body of Christ.
- 2.) During this pandemic, there is no obligation to assist at the Divine Sacrifice.

3.) Those who are sick, or carry symptoms of sickness must remain at home

- sickness, must remain at home.
 4.) All are recommended to give contact information (a list is provided at the door) in order to inform you if need arise from a case of the virus. All information remains *confidential* to the *parish* and is not transferred to any state agency.
- 5.) All vulnerable, elderly, and at-risk individuals should remain at home and follow the Liturgies as posted on the parish's website.
- 6.) The **Sunday Vigil** Masses are <u>suspended</u> until further notice.
- 7.) All who are retired, or who may have a freer weekday schedule, are asked to consider assisting at Mass during the weekdays, **Tues-Fri**, **9:00am**; and on **Saturday at 10:00am**. This would free up more room on Sunday for those who must work during the normal workweek.
- 8.) Please *do not use your hands* to cover sneezes and coughs. Everyone must have a face-mask, *hand-kerchief*, or tissues to safely control and cover all coughs, sneezes, congestion, etc.
- 9.) Hand sanitizers are available at the entrances and at the confessional.
- 10.) Seating at church must be "first-comefirst-served".
- 11.) Everyone must sit in such a way that there is *no one immediately in front* of them and *no one immediately behind* them.
- 12.) Everyone will need to *charitably assist* one another to sit throughout the entire church, occupying *all* pews while respecting "physical distancing".
- 13.) To control crowd flow, **doors** will be **locked** at the beginning of each Liturgy.
- 14.) A *six-foot distancing* must be observed by those who approach the Divine Altar and wish to receive the Divine Eucharist in **Holy Communion**.
- 15.) And, lastly, at the end of Mass, those who wish **to remain and pray** in the church are welcome to do so, but all others are asked *not to linger and visit within the church*. If one wishes to visit, please do so outside the church, being *mindful of the proper physical distancing*.

May their memory be eternal.


