ABOUNA'S REFLECTIONS

The Lord rested on this Sunday and gave a spiritual rest that never ends to all the faithful departed.

This Sunday marks the final abode for the good and for the bad when the week as we know it in this life shall end and a New Day begins which is called the Eighth Day

and will be the first and the last day without night which has no morning nor evening and no repetition until the Lord comes back and appears to us from heaven a second time.³ While we await the full manifestation of that everlasting Morning, we must move forward; this is the impulse of the Faith. In the New Covenant, the First Day of the week is "new" in the sense that it has been transformed into a sacramental representation of Eternity. Time is continually being renewed in grace, and this is represented in mystery by the weekly presence of Sunday, among the most ancient of Christian institutions dating from the days of the Apostles.⁴

On the morning of the Resurrection it was said to the disciples that "He will meet you in Galilee"⁵ and yet He appeared to them immediately, or shortly thereafter, in Jerusalem, apparently before meeting them in Galilee.

The grace of faith is a resurrection of the individual within Christ, and it moves us forward – *not* backward – ultimately directing us beyond time, whether "Galilee" or "Jerusalem", to the Day of Judgement and to the end of all temporal things as we know them. This gracious renewal of all things surrounding us in this life began with the reception of God's grace and the virtue of faith. The light of faith radiates from that morning of the Empty Tomb penetrating present darkness, confusion, and obscurity. It illuminates the path *in front* of us, not the steps that have fallen behind. Faith turns us full-face forward.

On the day of the Ascension the angels asked the Apostles why they were lingering, looking up to the sky, when there were prayers to be made and things to do.

Like the Apostles, we too are under grace and light in order to move forward in our lives as individuals, as families, and as communities. A parish is simply that part of the local human community touched by grace, transformed in faith, and united in the Life of Christ as one body. This is the vehicle of divine life.

Lingering, turned backward, is never the path of God. We must not loiter in "nostalgia",6 but must look forward toward our Lord in glory as He is present at the Right Hand of the Father and awaiting His return in time to judge the living and dead. This is the fundamental path of the Church, and the light in which the individual members of that Divine Community find their course and their meaning in life.

Move on; move forward; move upward in grace. *Only the devil moves backward*, resenting the act of creation, working to wound the beauty of the cosmos, upsetting the Divine Economy and the Plan of Salvation; simply put, he resists the movement toward divine glory. He journeys, perversely, in a backward movement filled with animosity, fury, and resentment. We, on the contrary, lifted up as the children of God, must move toward the Final Day of Christ's full Appearance.

This is why we Maronites within the Syriac tradition look always forward, with great hope, to the Eighth Day, the Morning without setting, and the magnificent Day of Hidden Glory. These are the meanings sacramentally present in **the Lord's Day**, Sunday. We intensely desire the "end of the world", not because it will be filled with apprehension and fear, but because it will be the full revelation of the Hidden God, the One Who created us and the One Whom our very nature yearns. Grace and faith elevate our being to the supernatural, and expand our capacities from merely human to those of the children of God. *Maranatha!*

Each day, we must move toward the Day of Judgement, or we are not moving at all, frustrating grace, faith, and renewed time. With this in mind, we will attempt to expand our faith in action and our charity in practice over the summer months, necessarily working in mutual aid and hospitality.

"Do not forget to show hospitality to strangers..."

We will develop and open up our parochial life as conditions allow and as needs dictate. Starting

with the **Ascension**, we will restore the liturgical vigils for the holydays that most often appear on weekdays such as the Assumption, All Saints, etc., as was done specifically for Christmas and Easter this year. Thus, there will be a **Vigil for the Ascension** on Wednesday, May 12th, at **6:00pm**. The Feast of the Ascension will be observed at the regular time of **9:00am** on May 13th.

Although we had intended to restore the **Friday Catechesis** for all of May, the state infection rates these last weeks have not been encouraging, and we will need to wait for a more opportune moment and follow Providence.

From June onward, as the Hidden God of Light allows, we will continue together on the path of the resurrection with other observances, liturgical and otherwise.

Let us all show **genuine charity** and **hospitality**. We open the doors of our parish and our hearts so that we may share the abundance of beauty that has been graciously given to us, without merit on our part, within the Maronite Church.

Continue to pray these coming months that things calm, and we will be able to open up more. The Lord of Glory will lay out the path for us as we move forward toward the Great Day, we need only follow it.

May the Hidden Father of Majesty enlighten our minds, soften our hearts, as we generously listen to the Voice of the Spirit of Holiness.

The Life-giving Cross

Please, take notice of our present protocols:

- 1.) All Catholics, of whatever Ritual Church, are more than welcome at Saint Joseph. We are all one Body of Christ.
- 2.) During this pandemic, there is no obligation to assist at the Divine Sacrifice.
- 3.) Those who are sick, or carry symptoms of sickness, must remain at home.
- 4.) All are recommended to give contact information (a list is provided at the door) in order to inform you if need arise from a case of the virus.
- 5.) All vulnerable, elderly, and at-risk individuals should remain at home and follow the Liturgies as posted on the parish's website.
- 6.) The **Vigil** Masses are <u>suspended</u> until further notice.
- 7.) Everyone is asked to wear a face-mask.
- 8.) Hand sanitizers are available at the entrances and at the confessional.
- 9.) Seating at church must be "first-come-first-served" and will be closed at "100".
- 10.) Everyone must sit in such a way that there is *no one immediately in front* of them and *no one immediately behind* them. The pews have been blocked off for this purpose.
- 11.) To control crowd flow and bring greater security, **doors** will be **locked** at the beginning of each Liturgy.
- 12.) A *six-foot distancing* is to be observed by those who approach the Divine Altar and wish

to receive the Divine Eucharist in **Holy Communion**.

13.) And, lastly, at the end of Mass, those who wish to remain and pray in the church are welcome to do so, but all are asked <u>not to linger, socialize, or visit</u> within the church. Please exit through the Appleton Street doorway. If one wishes to visit, please do so outside the church, being mindful of masking and observing proper physical distancing.
