

ABOUNA'S REFLECTIONS

It is with great joy that we honor and celebrate **Saint Joseph**, our parochial patron, during a Holy Year that has been proclaimed from **December 8**, **2020 – December 8**, **2021**.

This Year has been announced to honor the 150th Anniversary of the Consecration of the Church to the sacred protection of the Foster Father of the Word Incarnate. Blessed Pope Pius IX proclaimed Saint Joseph Patron of the Universal Church on December 8, 1870, in the decree *Quemadmodum Deus*.

In the recent December 8, 2020 decree from the Apostolic Penitentiary, it stated that "to reaffirm the universality of Saint Joseph's patronage in the Church", a plenary indulgence – the remission before God of all temporal punishment due to sin whose guilt

has already been forgiven – is granted to all Catholics who recite any approved prayer or act of piety toward Saint Joseph, especially on March 19th, principal feast-day of the Saint, and on May 1st, Saint Joseph the Artisan. A plenary indulgence is a gift of Holy Mother Church perfecting the healing process of salvation that follows our personal conversion, confession, and prayer, leading us to beatitude.

A plenary indulgence is also available to all the faithful who do the same on the **19**th **of any month**, or on **any Wednesday** (the day in the week commemorating Saint Joseph in the Latin tradition).

Prayers each day following the Alohoyoh Qourbonoh, from March 11 – 19th. You will find copies of the novena prayers in the booklets available at the entrances of the church. Please feel free to *take extra copies home* to those unable to attend – to those who may be housebound, sick, or frail – so that we may all pray as one community.

The **three actions required** for gaining a plenary indulgence are as follows:

- 1.) sacramental confession;
- 2.) reception in **Holy Communion of the Divine Eucharist**; and,
- 3.) **prayer for the pope's intentions.** These intentions are specified by the Holy Father for each month. Note that it is not necessary to know explicitly what they might be, and reciting the *Apostles' Creed, Our Father, Hail Mary,* and the *Glory be* is sufficient for this purpose.

The underlying **spiritual disposition** necessary to obtain a plenary indulgence is the **interior detachment from all sin**, even venial.

The works of piety or acts of devotion to honor and imitate Saint Joseph can be among the following:

1.) Contemplating the Lord's Prayer for at least thirty minutes. The Decree reads, "to rediscover our filial relationship with the Divine Father, to renew fidelity to prayer, (and) to listen and correspond with profound discernment to God's will".

- 2.) By participating in a religious retreat that is at least one day in length, and which includes meditation on Saint Joseph;
- 3.) By imitating Saint Joseph in his charity by accomplishing spiritual or corporal works of mercy;
- 4.) By recitation of the Rosary as a family or as an engaged couple;
- 5.) By praying the Litany to Saint Joseph (in the Latin tradition), or the *Akathistos* to Saint Joseph (in the Byzantine tradition), or any other prayer to Saint Joseph proper to other ecclesiastical traditions, **for the persecuted Church** *ad intra* **and** *ad extra*, and for the relief of all Christians suffering all forms of persecution; because, as the Decree of the Apostolic Penitentiary notes, "the flight of the Holy Family to Egypt shows us that God is there where man is in danger, where man suffers, where he must flee, where he experiences rejection and abandonment".
- 6.) By entrusting our day's labor to Saint Joseph the Artisan, or by invoking his assistance in finding work; finally,
- 7.) By reciting a prayer in honor of Saint Joseph, especially on March 19th and May 1st. This devotion can also be practiced on the 19th of every month, or on Wednesdays.

The Decree further states: "In the current context of health emergency, the gift of the plenary indulgence is particularly extended to the *elderly*, the *sick*, the *dying*, and to all those who, for legitimate reasons, are unable to leave the house, who, with a soul *detached from all sin*, and with the intention of fulfilling, as soon as possible, the three usual conditions, in their own home or wherever the impediment keeps them, recite an act of piety in honor of Saint Joseph – *Comfort of the Sick* and *Patron of a Happy Death* – offering, with trust in God, the pains and discomforts of their life."

From all eternity, our holy patron was chosen by Providence to watch over the early years of the Divine Son of God in His Incarnation and to act as a primary agent in His early education and formation. This unique man of faith, purity, fidelity, silence, obedience, charity, nobility, loyalty, chastity, and honor is worthy of the veneration paid to him. As the pope wrote: in his

loving obedience to Divine Providence, Saint Joseph was "creatively courageous".

May we all strive to honor, and most importantly, imitate this great laborer in the Divine Kingdom, and pray that he obtain for each of us the "grace of graces: our own conversion".



o thee, O blessed Joseph, do we come in our tribulation, and having implored the help of thy most holy Spouse, we confidently invoke thy patronage also.

hrough that charity which bound thee to the Immaculate Virgin Mother of God and through the paternal love with which thou didst embrace the Child Jesus, we humbly beseech thee graciously to regard the inheritance which Jesus Christ has purchased by His Blood, and with thy power and strength to aid us in our necessities.

most watchful guardian of the Holy Family, defend the chosen people of Jesus Christ;

O most loving father, ward off from us every contagion of error and corrupting influence; show pity to us, O most mighty protector, and assist us from heaven in our daily struggle with the power of darkness.

s once thou didst rescue the Child Jesus from the supreme peril of His life, so now protect God's Holy Church from the snares of the enemy and from all adversity; shield each one of us by thy constant protection, so that, supported by thine example and strengthened by thine aid, we may be able to live a holy life, die a happy death, and obtain eternal joy in Heaven. Amen.³

The Life-giving Cross

Please, take notice of our present protocols:

- 1.) All Catholics, of whatever Ritual Church, are more than welcome at Saint Joseph. We are all one Body of Christ.
- 2.) During this pandemic, there is no obligation to assist at the Divine Sacrifice.
- 3.) Those who are sick, or carry symptoms of sickness, must remain at home.
- 4.) All are recommended to give contact information (a list is provided at the door) in order to inform you if need arise from a case of the virus.
- 5.) All vulnerable, elderly, and at-risk individuals should remain at home and follow the Liturgies as posted on the parish's website.
- 6.) The **Vigil** Masses are <u>suspended</u> until further notice.
- 7.) All who are retired, or who may have a freer weekday schedule, are asked to consider assisting at Mass during the weekdays, **Tues-Fri**, 9:00am; and on **Saturday at 10:00am**.
- 8.) Everyone is asked to <u>wear a face-mask</u>.
- 9.) Hand sanitizers are available at the entrances and at the confessional.
- 10.) Seating at church must be "*first-come-first-served*" and will be closed at "100".
- 11.) Everyone must sit in such a way that there is *no one immediately in front* of them and *no one immediately behind* them. The pews have been blocked off for this purpose.
- 12.) To control crowd flow and bring greater security, **doors** will be **locked** at the beginning of each Liturgy.
- 13.) A *six-foot distancing* is to be observed by those who approach the Divine Altar and wish to receive the Divine Eucharist in **Holy Communion**.
- 14.) And, lastly, at the end of Mass, those who wish **to remain and pray** in the church are welcome to do so, but all others are asked *not to linger and visit within the church*. Please <u>exit through the Appleton Street</u> doorway. If one wishes to visit, please do so outside the church, being *mindful of the proper physical distancing*.

Through the prayers of Thy Mother, the prophets, apostles, and martyrs, watch over the living, and in Thy mercy forgive those who have died.⁷





The Traditional and Patriarchal Norms for the Great Fast

- A.) Ash Monday and the First Week of Great Lent and Great Week of the Passion and especially Great and Holy Friday of the Crucifixion through to noon on Saturday of the Great Light are Days of Fast and Abstinence according to our tradition.
- B.) For all, as a minimum requirement according to law, we must fast on Ash Monday and on Good Friday. Abstinence, minimally, must be observed on all Fridays of Great Lent. The days of fast are strictly to be meatless.
- C.) From the <u>age of reason</u> onward, all are obliged to follow the abstinence from all meat, meat products, and dairy products on these fast days.
- D.) All Fridays throughout the year are traditional days of fast and abstinence from all meat and dairy products.
- E.) In general, the sick, expectant mothers, and the elderly who need to eat regularly are exempted from fasting and abstinence, especially those who under medical care for chronic illnesses.
- F.) Still observing the quality of food stuffs, Saturdays and Sunday are not, in the eastern tradition, days of fasting.
- G.) Breaking the Fast is permitted also on the following feastdays:
 - 1.) Saint John Maron (March 2);
 - 2.) The Forty Martyrs (March 9);
 - 3.) Saint Patrick (March 17th);
 - 4.) Saint Joseph (March 19th); and,
 - 5.) The Annunciation (March 25th).

<u>QUANTITY</u>: In our tradition, the fast means no food whatsoever between midnight and noon, only water and medication are permitted.

QUALITY: Also, in our traditional eastern tradition, the days of fast are in practice more or less vegan, that is, no meat, no seafood, no meat products, no dairy products, and no eggs are eaten.
