ABOUNA'S REFLECTIONS

Time has been created by man to measure being, and as creatures are fluid in their existence so time also moves.

The Liturgical Year has a beginning (Announcements), a middle, and an end (Holy Cross). There are two great *temporal cycles* of Holy Nativity and of the Glorious Resurrection. Each has a period of preparation, a moment of festal celebration, and then continues in weeks of thanksgiving afterward. This beginning, middle, and end remind us that so too does God's Plan of Salvation – and every creature – have a beginning, a middle, and an end.

Having a beginning, middle, and end makes us note that everything has a purpose and reason for existence. There is nothing superfluous that exists. If we do not yet know its *raison d'être* of a thing this is due to our ignorance and not the futility of its being. And while man may exist at the pinnacle of the cosmos – being the juncture of matter and spirit – there is no creature that is unimportant in itself. Each has its own perfection and purpose. This is why *Adom* was set in the Garden to keep and tend it.³ All creatures, including time, should be treated and used with perfect knowledge of their origin from eternal Beauty.

While youth may have its own enthusiasm, the wisdom of age and experience are more profound and stable as accomplishments. The middle years of life should be perfected through determination and achievement in the service of God.

The Announcements (revelation) are no less important in the Liturgical Year than the last season of the Holy Cross (final judgement), and both are ordered within the Liturgical Year even as our birth in the spirit is to be directed to our final entrance into the Kingdom of Light.

Saint Paul tells us "to redeem the time"⁴, therefore every day, every moment, is meant to be transfigured by holiness and grace. Every day has a value when it is lived in its proper form under light and grace. We pray each day and honor the Hidden One. As time measures existence, and daily life is ennobled by grace and personal fidelity to the Gospel, so time itself is transformed and redeemed for God's glory and our salvation. We should not amble through life, or just bob along – time is too short for that. Indeed, our Lord reminded us that idleness is ruthless in its destruction of the good, and we shall have to answer for every idle word come the day of judgement.⁵

Time, when used correctly, permits us a more profound understanding of the life faith, hope, and charity:

Nothing that is worth doing can be achieved in our lifetime; therefore we must be saved by hope. Nothing which is true or beautiful or good makes complete sense in any immediate context of history; therefore we must be saved by faith. Nothing we do, however virtuous, can be accomplished alone; therefore we must be saved by love.⁶

The Liturgical Year is thus more than an annual cycle of Sundays and Holydays that we may or may not observe; it is a reminder that every being, especially every human person, has a purpose in existence and a human lifetime is precious. It is a treasure not to be piddled away, but one that must be freely oriented in grace toward the redeeming love of the Messiah.

December 15-23rd inclusively

As we were reminded by our Patriarch in his recent

Lenten Letter, it is our tradition to fast in preparation for the great feasts, and all are encouraged to do so faithfully, *par*. 25:

This fast is known as "The Fast of the Nativity", during which the faithful abstain from eating meat, dairy products, and eggs, from December 16th and ends December 24th.

NB for the faithful in the USA, who celebrate Christmas Eve much as Christmas, the dates are 15th-23rd December inclusively.

We are reminded in *paragraph* 21 of the same letter that "a fast" is to go without all foods from midnight to noon, after which we abstain from all animal flesh and animal products – this is most similar to a "vegan" diet as one would call it these days.

When a fast day falls on a Saturday or a Sunday (as will be the case this year on December 15th and on December 21-22nd) one can eat as they wish throughout the day, but should still abstain from all animal flesh and animal products.

These observances are for all who have attained the age of the use of reason, par. 22.
