

#### **ABOUNA'S REFLECTIONS**

Lift our minds and hearts, and proceed without fear and anxiety. This week I have been reading Reasonable Pleasures by Fr. James Schall, SJ. Beautifully written, it is excellent and thought-provoking. When I first picked it up I thought it to be for distraction, but as I read more and more I realized that it went straight to the heart of our present crisis. Without vision, the people perish.<sup>3</sup>

During these days of trial, we are being asked: where is our vision? What do we seek? Where lies our treasure? In a world that displays the ephemeralness of everything, it is the sightless that scatter and perish, but not before having clung and panicked about their situation.

We have purpose, and no reason to scatter into a vortex of anxiety.

Fr. Schall's thesis is that there is an order among the things of the world and especially a coherence of the things that surround the Catholic Faith. We possess treasures and should not let ourselves be waylaid by the "what if's" and anxiousness that results from conditional phrasing. Underlying all reality, down to the tiniest particle, the Hidden God is in charge. All things He directs and governs. We must enter the light of faith more deeply, see, and then focus on what we do have right now, at this minute, but in awareness of the divine presence. With all things calming around the planet - and apparently cleaning up already our polluted world (fish have returned to the canals of Venice!) - Providence giving us time to do a profoundly good Lent. Should we waste this gift?

Reading and praying, in any case, lifts the mind and spirit – infinitely better than indulgent eating from out of boredom and fear, or in binge-watching and zoning out for hours before a screen. Sad use of precious time those!

Reasonable Pleasures considers the nuances, multiplicity, richness, and variety of all that is enfolded within the true Faith as a coherent whole. The Faith is not a mere cerebral exercise, or a form of intellectualism; its abundance and variation are what lend it *credibility* for even the most obtuse. One does not have to be learned or even especially bright to love the centuries-long musical tradition of Church, for example. God enlightens the mind and heart through a panoply of rich treasures that radiate goodness in both little ways and in great things, enveloping the human experience and elevating the person to the obscurely radiant Divine - for those who have eyes to see, and ears to hear. This is why our own individual lives are so important as visible examples for others to see: we must live in that purity of heart, and in the joy that can come only from grace. This is the most common way that others are brought to embrace the Gospel.

Grace and faith give light, heal blindness, and, when fruitful, give transcendent vision, clarified mind, and luminous heart to the believer.<sup>4</sup> To live focused and centered on the Hidden One of all consolation

delivers us from this valley of tears into the freedom of the children of God.

After Mass last weekend, a young couple pushing a baby-pram stopped me outside the church to thank us for keeping our church open. They weren't particularly religious – although vaguely aware that they had been baptized Catholic as babies – but they gave a donation to the church. Because our doors were not locked, this little community and her example had given them hope. Another family from across the country sent online a small donation with an attached note thanking us for being open. *Their* church had been closed, and they were happy, they said, to see the priest among the flock to lead, give hope, and guide. Is this not why we are here?

We are all in this together, and the coherence of the Catholic Faith – especially for us in our Syriac tradition – radiates hope and beauty. It gives us cause, always, to rejoice.

Fear is the emotional response to a <u>remote</u> "evil".<sup>5</sup> When something bad is on our doorstep we respond emotionally to a <u>proximate</u> "evil" with anger. Fear is our apprehension from an approaching but distant evil. When we see, or cannot see fully, an approaching evil thus causes fear and anxiety.

As Christians, we are heirs of ancient treasures that are ever present. The treasures of faith, the examples of the saints, and the traditions of our hope, link us necessarily to that supernatural love and charity that knows no fear.<sup>6</sup> This crisis is *not* a disaster, but an act of providence to draw the children of God deeper into their Faith. It is, for us, a call to enter more profoundly into our heritage as Maronite Catholics. We know the magnanimously beautiful example of Saint Rafka in how we should face illness and suffering – it is not in anxiety, terror, and fear! May she strengthen our steps.

Things become hopeless and discouraging only when vision is extinguished and hope is snuffed out, but these losses can happen only *after* charity has grown cold and broken. This week's brief blast of snow was indicative of that charity that has been smothered, sadly, in the hearts of far too many. We live in a world that is, humanly, very distant from the Hidden Goodness to which it is called.

So, pray, contemplate, and read. We are still in the Great Fast, so let us not lose these last days of grace. Sitting endlessly in front of a screen would be truly tragic – a capitulation before the unknown. It wastes our time, fritters away grace, repudiates divine love, and enfeebles us. Our rosary, making spiritual communions, the Jesus Prayer, *lectio divina*, spiritual reading, and the rest of our spiritual arsenal need no electricity, but are themselves a source of energy. In that power, they generate hope and vision; and these enkindle charity. In these blindness is lifted, spirits are clarified, and illuminative fire strengthens us in encouragement.

Catholics should be the most fearless of all those in this valley of tears. Look within our present circumstances for the divine and resonant Voice that speaks to us at all times.

Maronites, as disciples of our God and Savior and heirs of the martyrs, should be among those who, in that true vision and reassuring strength, are ready to bring consolation and service to those who are not so fortunate and who wander in this present darkness.

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>5</sup> Commonly used, the word "evil" today means a heinous act or actions that go beyond all measure of what is humanly imaginable. To the modern mind, it is this *excess* that makes an act "evil" and not just "bad".

What we call "evil" in a philosophical sense, however, is anything that lacks "good" or perfection that it should have. This also may be modified for the individual by *subjective* view. A child may hate the medical treatment he has to undergo, but the medicine is not for all that "evil" although it might be perceived in that manner by the child, who as a result will be *scared*.

An evil can be **natural/physical**, such as a hurricane or sickness, or it can be moral. A **moral** evil is any action that lacks its proper ordering toward objective good and in this way fails to reflect the eternal goodness of God. Any action that fails in the perfection of goodness is a moral "evil" in this sense, and is defined a "sin" from the moral point of view, regardless of the perpetrator's judgement. Not all sins are the same, because not all defects are equal, which is why some moral actions fail greatly and others are failures in a smaller manner: mortal/venial sin.

#### The Traditional and Patriarchal Norms for the Great Lent

- A.) Ash Monday and the First Week of Great
  Lent and Great Week of the Passion and
  especially Great and Holy Friday of the
  Crucifixion through to noon on Saturday of
  the Great Light are Days of Fast and
  Abstinence according to our patriarchal
  tradition. cf. par. 22
- B.) For all, as a minimum requirement according to law, we must fast on Ash Monday and on Good Friday. Abstinence is to be observed on all Fridays of Lent. These days of fast are strictly to be meatless.
- C.) From the age of reason onward, all are meant to observe the abstinence from all meat, meat products, and dairy products on fast days even if they are strictly not obliged to fast.
- D.) All Fridays throughout the year are traditional days of fast and abstinence from all meat and dairy products.
- E.) In general, the sick, expectant mothers, and the elderly who need to eat regularly are exempted from fasting and abstinence, especially those who are taking medications associated with chronic illnesses.
- F.) Saturdays and Sunday, although abstaining in the quality of foods, are not, in the eastern tradition, days of fasting.

- G.) Breaking the Fast is permitted also on the following feastdays:
  - 1.) Saint John Maron (March 2);
  - 2.) The Forty Martyrs (March 9);
  - 3.) Saint Patrick (USA) (March 17th);
  - 4.) Saint Joseph (March 19th); and,
  - 5.) The Annunciation (March 25th).

QUANTITY: In our tradition, the fast means no food whatsoever between midnight and noon, only water and medication are permitted.

QUALITY: Also, in our eastern tradition, the days of fast are in practice more or less vegan, that is, no meat, no seafood, no meat products, no dairy products and no eggs are to be eaten.


(Budgeted: \$3,100.00) **Regular Collection:** \$1,077.00
