Now if the ministry of death was yet glorious despite being written engraved on stones (so much so that the sons of Israel could not look upon the face of Moses due to its glory – however transient it was) then surely the

ministry of the Spirit will be even more glorious than that.

If the task of bearing a message of condemnation was a glorious thing, then how much more glorious is the ministry of justice! By comparison to this extraordinary glory, the thing that was before made glorious was not really glorious at all;

and if something that has vanished was glorious, that which endures will be far more glorious.

It is because we have this hope that we act so freely. We are not as Moses was.

He veiled his face so that the sons of Israel could not see the full extent of something that was, in fact, perishing.

Moreover, their minds have been blinded, for even up to this day that veil remains over them whenever the Old Covenant is read; they do not realize that the Messiah has abolished it. Even these days a veil lies over their hearts whenever Moses is read, and yet whenever one of them turns to the Lord, this veil is removed. Now the Lord is the Spirit, and wherever the Spirit of the Lord is, there is liberty.

All of us, with faces unveiled, see the Lord's glory as in a mirror, and we are being changed into that likeness, from one glory to another, as by the Lord, the Spirit.

ABOUNA'S REFLECTIONS

The eastern Mediterranean Sea washes up against a dramatic shoreline that crashes up from its coast into a double range of mountains. The Lebanon is a magnificent geographical location. Majestic in beauty, it is used as a type in the Sacred Scriptures

of divine strength, grandeur, and the power of holiness. The mountains and their cedars have become transcendent in typological sacred meaning.

Lebanon, in recent history, is also a modern state. Like other modern states it has a national government, a parliament, an army, trade and international commerce; but unlike other modern states, Lebanon is more than herself. Established as a multi-confessional state, she is more than a "state"; she is a message to the world. She has modeled what might be done in the Middle East where no single religious tradition is *the* "state religion". Different from the secular states of Syria and Iraq (both now more or less destroyed) she has been able to do this without political tyranny.

Lebanon has been a voice in the wilderness proclaiming the possibility that various groups of religious persons can live together in harmony; and this she has done surrounded by countries who refuse to listen. Their neighborhood is not a friendly or harmonious one. Even as the country goes through its present crises – with little help from its corrupt governing class – the population once again shows its solidarity and collaborative ability.

For these reasons, the Lebanon has always been more than herself, less than herself, and transcendent in her possibilities. Lebanon is more than a country; she is more than a modern state; and it is in our own interests to see that she survives as a model of possible world, and alternative to her reckless neighbors. She shows what can be, that religion does not have to hold hegemony over a historically mixed and diverse people.

Lebanon is not a Middle Eastern version of the US, but neither is Israel. In Lebanon religion is a major factor in individual life. Religion influences the lives of the citizens, but no one religion holds sway over the others in the country. Shia, Sunni, Druze, and Christian all collaborate.

In Israel, Judaism holds predominant power and hegemony over the others present within the state. It defines the legality of marriage, the scope of

military draft, and the freedom of its residents. Israel should not be confused with being a version of the US in the Near East as is often done by some Americans.

Of course, other regional powers impose one version or another of Islam as a state religion, and in them it is illegal to convert to Christianity. But even with these limitations, it was in the most secular countries – Syria and Iraq – where minorities have had space to breathe and prosper. Upending everything, the invasions and military excursions of the last twenty years have almost wiped out the two-thousand-year-old Christian presence even in those countries.

Throughout its history, the Lebanon and her people have acted as bridges between East and West and between religious bodies. The Lebanon has also been a place of refuge for the persecuted. It would be wrong to exaggerate the *necessity* of Lebanon, but even as a struggling country, her make-up and her history are of vital importance in modern international diplomacy, and it would be difficult to exaggerate her exemplary *importance* – Scriptural, historical, political, or social.

All things being equal, Lebanon may not be *absolutely* necessary to the world, but as things stand now, she is of *vital* and *central* importance. Please, do pray and fast for Lebanon.

May the Good One hear our prayers, and may He lavish His choicest graces upon her citizens so that they may realize their providential mission and become faithful stewards. May they become the best versions of themselves: faithful and persevering in the footsteps of Saints Sergius, Bacchus, Nouhra, Massabkis, Sharbel, and Rafqa.

May the Merciful One hear our supplications!

The Life-giving Cross

Please, kindly take notice of our present practices:

- 1.) All Catholics, of whatever Ritual Church, are more than welcome at Saint Joseph. We are all one Body of Christ.
- 2.) During this pandemic, there is no obligation to assist at the Divine Sacrifice.
- 3.) Those who are sick, or carry symptoms of sickness, must remain at home.
- 4.) All are recommended to give contact information (a list is provided at the door) in order to inform you if need arise from a case of the virus. All information remains *confidential* to the *parish* and is not transferred to any state agency.
- 5.) All vulnerable, elderly, and at-risk individuals should remain at home and follow the Liturgies as posted on the parish's website.
- 6.) The **Saturday Vigil** Masses are <u>cancelled</u> until further notice.
- 7.) The **weekday Masses** have been moved into the main church to easily allow for "physical distancing" among the pews.
- 8.) All who are retired, or who may have a freer weekday schedule, are asked to consider assisting at Mass during the weekdays, **Tues-Fri**, **9:00am**; and on **Saturday at 10:00am**. This would free up more room on Sunday for those who must work during the normal workweek.
- 9.) Please *do not use your hands* to cover sneezes and coughs. Everyone must have a *hand-kerchief*, tissues, or face-mask to safely control and cover all coughs, sneezes, congestion, etc.
- 10.) Hand sanitizers are available at the entrances and at the confessional.
- 11.) Arrivals at church must be "first-come-first-served". These also have the first choice of where they wish to sit.
- 12.) Everyone must sit in such a way that there is *no one immediately in front* of them and *no one immediately behind* them. Kindly follow the directions given by those trying to usher.
- 13.) Everyone will need to *charitably assist* one another to sit throughout the entire church,

- occupying *all* pews and spaces available with "physical distancing".
- 14.) To control crowd flow, **doors** will be **locked** at the beginning of each Liturgy, and this for the foreseeable future.
- 15.) A *six-foot distancing* must continue to be observed by those who approach the Divine Altar and wish to receive the Most Holy Eucharist in **Communion**.
- 16.) And, lastly, at the end of Mass, those who wish **to remain and pray** in the church are welcome to do so, but all others are asked *not to linger and visit within the church*. If one wishes to visit, please do so outside the church, being *mindful of the proper physical distancing*.

God bless everyone for making these efforts and being charitably attentive in how we present ourselves together before the Hidden Good One.

May their memory be eternal.

The Sast of the Sormition

The Assumption of the Ever-Virgin Mary into Heaven, body and soul (August 15th)

As we were reminded by our Patriarch in his encyclical, it is our tradition to fast in preparation for the great feasts, and all are encouraged to do so faithfully, *par*. 24:

This fast is known as "The Fast of the Virgin", during which the faithful abstain from eating meat, dairy products, and eggs, from August 7th until August 14th inclusively.

We are reminded in *paragraph* 21 of the same letter that "a fast" is to go without all foods *from midnight to noon*, after which we *abstain from all animal flesh and most animal products* – this is most similar to a "vegan" diet as one would call it these days.

When a fast day falls on a Saturday or a Sunday (as will be the case on August 8th and 9th this year) one can eat as they wish, but should still abstain from animal flesh and animal products.

These observances are for all who have attained the age of the use of reason, *par*. 22.
