

ABOUNA'S REFLECTIONS

Inevitable death: entrance into the burning light of charitable justice Part VII

Time marches onward. Moving toward the Divine Embrace – as all things must – in the full Epiphany of Glory that shall be the end of time as we know it, we do so both historically and individually; but the course is the same. The Hidden Creator chose freely to makes things exists so that they might share in the Infinite Goodness of His divinity. For some creatures this means simply the blessing of existence, but for others it means to exist and to live; yet for others, it has been given to exist and live in an intelligent and free manner.

Human beings share in this last category: to live freely and intelligently by nature so that we might dispose ourselves to receive grace and collaborate with the divine charity of God as He generously offers us to do so. We have been created *from* Love, *in order to* love, and finally to *enter* into Love at its highest form. Therefore, individually and historically all things move toward the final and ultimate divine embrace of God. As all things must do this, each according to its nature, so there is little that can be done except to fulfill this purpose, and for men this means to be known, to know, and to learn to love correctly.

Perhaps as we approach the holyday season an image might be useful. When a grandmother sees her grandchild, especially when it has been a long time since last visiting, she wishes to greet, hold and cherish the child. The child may have a different idea. Often the child is focused on other things, like cookies or toys, or even the excitement of the day. Distraction makes little ones to squirm and crawl out of embraces - however loving those arms may be. We accept this behavior in children because they are by definition immature, but as time goes on we expect a more human and mature response to love. To reject love because one is distracted by other things would be hurtful to the one who loves, and even hateful if done seriously and habitually. So it is with God.

All things move towards the Divine Embrace that we call "The Day of the Lord" or "The Last Judgment:" the full manifestation of Divine Charity that is simultaneously a manifestation of Divine Justice. On that Day, the effects of definitive reciprocated love or final damnation result from how we have reacted earlier throughout our lives to the divine embrace that we call "grace." If we have been loving and selfless, transformed by grace and made Christ-like as the children of light,1 we will enter joyfully into the Divine Light. If, to the contrary, we have been rather self-centered and focused on the things of this world, deaf to grace and its transformation, then one is indisposed to the Fire of Divine Charity. It will be with great hesitation and fear that we will approach that Day of manifest Love. What is now light, warmth and love, will become blinding, burning and scathing to those so disposed - those who have been wrapped up in themselves.2

Who would not fear the awesome Judge,
Who holds in His Hands the burning Torch?
By Fire He will judge,
and with Flames He will separate
the good from the evil.³

Should we have been fundamentally self-centered, then we will hate that Day and flee from that Love. Historically, this will end for all things at the end of time; individually, we each enter into this mystery of love/judgment the moment we die. The Last Judgment will only broadcast what we have already experienced.

The familial image of a grandmother hugging her beloved grandchild can be translated into the reality of the selfish person being "hugged" by

Divine Charity; while it is true that there may be a little wiggle-room in the first example (you can get away from grandma without harm) in the divine Embrace, it will burn. As Divine Charity is eternal, so shall be the burn.

Thus, we might consider:

- 1.) The Lord God has revealed Itself as Tri-Unity: One Divine Nature/Subsistent Selflessness. Grace is meant to divinize each human being making us godlike, that is, selfless. In so far as one falls short of selflessness in life, she falls short of the divine embrace and entrance into Light.
- 2.) The love of God is portrayed as Fire, especially in the Syriac tradition, which both illuminates and burns according to the disposition of the recipient. We must learn to pray and be "from fire."4 This is the meaning of Our Lord saying that He came not to judge/condemn, but to save. Charity is what is meant to save us, but we are often like the child who wriggles and squirms within grandma's embrace because he wishes to run off and play. We are often too distracted, or selfish, to receive love. In immature children this is accepted as part of their childishness, but an adult who rejects or scorns love is suspect at best, and usually immature - at an age when this is contemptible. Our Lord stated that He came that they might have life and have it more abundantly, willy-nilly the outcome results from our response to divine love.
- 3.) Because the purpose of all existence is to manifest eternal Goodness, Love as fire can thus illuminate those who are receptive, but it burns those who refuse it. Our destiny is to stand in the full presence of Divine Charity. Freedom and love are the key concepts, not death or acceptance by faith or even justice. Spurned love is offensive to all involved; we know this from human experience. For this reason it has been said by the

saints that hell/damnation is the Love of God. It is being forced to be present forever to Someone Whom we *now* know to wish nothing but good to us. Ouch.

4.) Purgation/purification is the state of those who have loved God fundamentally, but who squirmed too much and too often in selfish endeavors. They are not fully selfless (they are un-godlike, stained by selfish concerns) and thus they are unable to enter into the eternal Light of Subsistent Selflessness.

We pray for the dead because we pray for all, and we know the destiny of no one except Judas on the one hand, or the saints on the other. The blemished and rather selfish lot that is the rest of us we commend to God's Mercy.

Hope of the living and Harbor of safety,
Where all who are weary and troubled
by the surging waves
and misfortunes of this world find rest;
grant that we may safely reach Your Port,
the place of eternal rest,
with all who have been pleasing to You.
Glory to You: Father, Son and Holy Spirit, forever.
Amen⁵

So, in the end, it's all about how well we have learned to love and allowed ourselves to be taken out of — transcend — our naturally occurring egocentric selves. Sin is not the problem: it's a symptom of the problem. This is why the disciples of the Messiah are ordered to take up their crosses daily and follow Him. Nothing has the capability to teach selflessness better than suffering; of course, wrongly received it can also embitter. The choice is ours. That we suffer is not God's intent, but rather that we allow ourselves to be removed from the habitual self-reliance that is the source of arrogance and self-centeredness so natural to us all. Drawn out of our navel-gazing, grace can elevate us and transform our hearts into God.

How we do in all this determines how well we enter the pure Fire of Divine Charity. *Judgment* thus is more the result of how we've chosen to
